ARRIVAL OF THE CANADA.

The Steamship Canada, arrived yesterday morning with dates to the 15th inst. She brought £25,000 of specie (new coinage) for Halifax.

A rumour was in circulation that Garibaldi had been assassinated, but it probably arose from the fact that there had been an assassination of an officer in Garibaldi's service.

Further details of the capture of Pekin are given. The Emperor of China was supposed to have fled to Tartary.

The "looting" of the Emperor's palace at Pekin, gave rare picking to the allied soldiery. Innumerable articles of great value were freely appropriated, and what could not be carried away was smashed to pieces—the French soldiers being most active in the latter species of amusement.

It was reported that the Emperor had fled to his palace Yehol, in Tartary. What arrangements will now be made, and with whom the treaty will be made, are matters of conjecture.

No information has been obtained about Captain Brazazon and Mr. Bowly by the Times special correspondent.

The Empress of the French has been passing her time in enjoying the hospilities of Windsor, and the sights in London, and the Queen, the Prince Consort, and other members of the Royal Family, have made friendly calls on the Empress at Clarence's Hotel, where she has been staying during the intervals of her rounds of visits.

INUNDATIONS IN SPAIN.—Disastrous inundations have taken place in Spain. The Badajoz Asylum was swept away, and many children killed and injured.

The garrison of Pekin is reported to be 60,000 to 70,000.

BOSTON, Dec. 21.—The South Carolina Convention yesterday, unanimously passed an ordinance seceding from the United States.
