THE GOLD FIELDS OF NOVA SCOTIA. - Some considerable excitement has existed in the city during the past week by the report that valuable deposits of gold had been discovered in the quartz rocks on the Tangier River.

The Neptune, Steam-tug arrived from Boston on Sunday last. She has engines of 80 horse power and makes 13 knots. She is intended for towing, pleasure trips, &c.
