LUNATIC ASYLUM.—A musical Treat was given by the Harmonic Society, to the inmates of this Institution on Tuesday the 3rd inst. The worthy superintendent gave invitations to a number of gentlemen and friends in the city. At the close of the performance, the Hon. Wm. Young gave a glowing eulogium on the appearance of the Institution and especially on the excellent management under Dr. DeWolfe. The Honorable gentleman paid both the Dr. and Mrs. DeWolfe a well merited compliment for the great interest they manifest in the comfort, welfare and happiness of their unfortunate patients.
