Occupying a seat on the bench for 53 years, a tenure of office unexampled in judicial annals, and for more than half of that period Chief Justice of the Province, he was distinguished by great ability, a sound discriminating judgment, unwearied patience and industry, a strong inherent love of justice, and an earnest, anxious, faithful attention to the discharge of every duty.

Resolved, That the Bench and the Bar as a further mark of their respect do attend the Funeral of the late Chief Justice, and that they do wear crape for the period of one month.

AN EYELESS BIRD.—Mr. Albert Guthrie, recently found a blackbird on the farm of John Young, in West Bradford, Pa., and on approaching near to it he discovered that it made no effort to get away. With trouble he caught it, and upon examination found that it had no eyes. There was no sign to indicate that it ever had eyes. The points where the eyes should have been were grown over with feathers. Mr. Guthrie has caged the bird, and intends retaining it as a pet.

THE HAYING SEASON.—No crop is of more consequence to the farmer or to this country generally, than the hay-crop. The long spells of dry weather will cause a very considerable diminution of the quantity raised this year. The late rains will render essential service in filling out the stalk, and in improving the quality, but it is probable that there will be but a portion of the usual quantity raised. The rains coming late will no doubt cause it to be later than usual, before it is ready for the scythe.

As one of the boats of the South Ferry was crossing the harbor, on Wednesday forenoon, the mate, shortly after leaving Dartmouth dock, discovered a boat apparently empty, and with oars lying across, about 800 yards off, or nearly in the middle of the harbor. It was immediately made for, and, on coming up, a person was seen endeavoring to catch the top of the boat; but, before the mate of the steamer had time to jump into the flat, to rescue the drowning person, he sank to rise no more. On board the boat was found a young man asleep, and, on being awakened and asked where his comrade was, he expressed surprise at his loss. It is said they were both in liquor. The one drowned was named Chipman.

HANTSPOUT.—The Chronicle informs us that His Excellency Lord Mulgrave and the Admiral Sir A. Milne, and others, made a trip to Hantsport, on the 14th inst., for the purpose of ascertaining the practicability of the Prince of Wales embarking there for New Brunswick. The result of the visit, it is added, was, we are given to understand, entirely satisfactory, and Hantsport, it appears is selected as the most suitable place for the Prince's embarkation, and will be doubly honored by his landing there again on his return to Nova Scotia, whence he returns to Windsor, thence by rail to the Junction, and via Truro, will pass through to Pictou.
