TURKEY

ALARMING NEWS.—THE WHOLE OF LEBANON IN ARMS.—Accounts of an alarming nature have reached us from Beyrout. The whole of the Lebanon is in arms. The disputes which it would appear to have been for a long time past the special object of the Maronite Kaimakan Emir Beshir Achmet to foster have at length reached their culmination. The Druses have turned out en masse, and a fierce civil war between them and the Christians is being carried on. Neither the Turkish Governor nor the Pasha in command of the troops appears to be able to arrest the work of destruction. The Druses, though very inferior in numbers, are more warlike than the Christian population, and they seem to be carrying all before them. They number about 15,000 fighting men in the Lebanon; but, unless the Turkish authorities put a speedy stop to the outbreak this force will no doubt be largely augmented by the Druses of the Hawran. A great number of Maronite villages have been burnt; Deir-el-Kumar, the principal town of the Lebanon, is besieged by the Druses and there is reason to fear a fearful slaughter, should the place be taken before a sufficient force of Turkish troops can be got up to relieve it. It is impossible at the present moment to place much reliance on the accounts which reach this place, but there has doubtless been considerable slaughter. Even if speedily quelled, the disturbances will have cost the country the whole of the harvest, including the very valuable silk crop. At the best, all the horrors of famine and pestilence will be necessarily entailed.

ITALY.

His Majesty of Naples is not without his friends in Europe, who will, no doubt, try to save him from utter extinction. The delicate position of the Sardinian Government affords a ground for interposition in the favour of Naples and this is the point which the Russian Minister at Turin has been instructed to inform the Piedmontese Cabinet that the Russian diplomatic officials will leave Piedmont in a body unless some steps are taken to put an end to the public aid which is given to Garibaldi in Sicily. At the Baden Conference, too, the Prince Regent of Prussia is said to have specially referred to the state of Italy. His Royal Highness is declared to have expressed an opinion that the Sardinian Government "was overrun by revolution," and if nothing were done to stop it the revolutionary spirit might spread throughout Europe.

Advices from Rome say that the French troops will remain in the city to defend it against any attack from whatever quarter it might proceed. The addition made to this intelligence is very fatal to the Pope. France, it is said, will guarantee Rome to his Holiness, but nothing more. He has turned a deaf ear to all projects of reform, and the Imperial Government can no longer interpose, should the Papal subjects revolt against the "tyranny and ill-treatment of the foreign mercenaries" of the Papal dominions. It is said, however, that the Government of France has given permission to the Pope to raise a loan of twenty-five millions of francs, to bear interest at five per cent.

CHINA.

The Malabar, with Lord Elgin and Baron Gros on board was wrecked when about to leave Galle harbour on the 22nd of May. All the passengers and crew were saved. A portion of the mails was saved. Both Ambassadors have lost their credentials and papers. All the bullion and baggage sank with the ship. The Ambassadors were to sail on the 6th of June for Hongkong.

SPAIN.

Senor Escalante has been set at liberty, the authorities having at last acknowledged that they could substantiate no charge against him.

MISCELLANEOUS.

MR. SPURGEON'S LETTER AND THE FRENCH GOVERNMENT.—The delivery of The Times in Paris on the 26th ult. was kept back several hours in consequence of its containing a political letter from Baden by the Rev. Mr. Spurgeon.

It is rumoured that the Emperor of France is in correspondence with the Count de Chambord and with the Orleans family for the purpose of bringing the remains of Charles X. and of Louis Philippe to St. Denis, to be interred with the remains of the other Sovereigns of France.

THE EXPELLED GRAND DUKES.—A letter from Vienna says:—The expelled Italian dukes appear to have decided on living in retirement, at least for the present in some German state; the Grand Duke of Tuscany has taken up his residence in a chateau at Schassenbad, near Lindau; the Duchess of Parma is about to reside with her son Duke Robert, in a villa at Rorschach, near Wartensee; and the Duke of Modena is every day expected at his chateau in Bohemia.

THE WEATHER: A WARNING.—We venture on this note for the purpose of urging all to sanitary precautions; for after such a long winter and lingering spring, there is every prospect of an autumn of intense heat, which will seriously affect health. The heads of families should themselves make examination and be assured that the drainage is in proper order, and as far as possible, have all dangerous matters removed from the neighbourhood of their premises. In like manner sanitary inspectors should with care and energy see that the poor are cared for and protected against the effects of the weather which may be anticipated.—Builder.

There are six Pianos in the Establishment, and Pupils boarding in the vicinity will be charged Five Shillings per Quarter for the use of an instrument to practice.

Prince of Wales' Visit. PROGRAMME.

ADMIRAL'S PROGRAMME.

The Naval-Commander-in-Chief begs herewith to make known the following programme respecting the arrival of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales in this Harbour, in so far as it is connected with Her Majesty's Naval Service:

1. On the Squadron of His Royal Highness, consisting of Her Majesty's Ships Hero, Ariadne and flying Fish, arriving at George's Island, Her Majesty's ships in port will dress Ship and salute His Royal Highness's Standard with 21 guns.

2. On Her Majesty's Ship Hero coming to moorings off the Dockyard, Her Majesty's Ships in port will man yards and greet His Royal Highness with three cheers.

3. On His Royal Highness leaving Her Majesty's Ship Hero in the Barge for the shore, all Her Majesty's Ships in port will be dressed in colors, the yards will be manned, and the crews will cheer His Royal Highness on passing, and a general royal salute will be fired.

4. On His Royal Highness reaching the landing steps in the Dockyard, he will be received by the Naval Commander-in-Chief, Naval Officers, and other naval authorities.

5. On His Royal Highness stepping on the soil of Nova Scotia, His Royal Highness's Standard will be hoisted in the Dockyard; and will be saluted by all Her Majesty's Ships; His Royal Highness will be here received by His Excellency the Governor and Staff, the Major General commanding in chief, the Mayor and Corporation, and other public authorities.

6. From the landing place at the Dockyard, His Royal Highness will proceed in procession to Government House.

7. On the evening of His Royal Highness's arrival, or on such other evening as may be selected for the general illumination, Her Majesty's ships will be illuminated at a fixed hour, of which due notice will be given.

The Naval Commander-in-Chief has endeavored, in so far as the limited space of his command will admit, to afford accommodation on raised platforms, for the Members of the Government, the Legislature of the Province, the Mayor and Corporation, and others holding public appointments, for the purpose of witnessing the interesting event of His Royal Highness's landing in this Province. To these reserved places, cards of admission will be issued, signed by the Naval Commander-in-Chief. In addition to the raised platform, as much space as possible will be set apart for the use of the public, from whence a view of the landing or procession may be obtained.

1. On the end and side of the wharf east of the landing place.

2. On the Careening Wharf, except the part reserved for the Military Staff and those who are to form in the procession.

3. In the rear of the Guard of Honor.

4. Two spaces in the centre of the Dockyard, on each side of the road from the Dockyard gate.

5. The Observatory Hill in the Dockyard.

These positions will be pointed out by placards marked "Public." The Naval Commander-in-Chief will be much obliged to those who may visit the Dockyard on this occasion, if they will adhere to the regulations that will be issued, and confine themselves to the places set apart for their accommodation, and he begs that no persons will leave their places or the Dockyard until the procession has passed the main gate—for unless he receives support and assistance from those who are present, confusion and disappointment may occur.

On His Royal Highness leaving Halifax, a Royal Salute will be fired from all Her Majesty's ships.

P. S.—Any information which may be required will be readily afforded at the Naval Commander-in-Chief's office in the Dockyard, any day before 12 o'clock.

MAJOR GENERAL'S PROGRAMME.

On H. M. S. Hero, with His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales on board, being signalled, three guns will be fired in quick succession from the Citadel, and the Union Jack will be hoisted on the Staff on which the Mail signal is usually displayed as a notice of the approach of the Prince.

As the Hero passes up the Harbor, each Battery will fire a Royal Salute.

Salutes will again be fired from the Citadel and George's Island on the landing of His Royal Highness.

His Royal Highness will be received by Guards of Honor, furnished from the 62nd and 63rd Regiments, at H. M. Dockyard and Government House.

The streets will be lined from the Dockyard to Government House by Her Majesty's Forces in conjunction with the Volunteer Companies and the various Societies.

On the day after the arrival of His Royal Highness, a Review of Her Majesty's Troops and the Volunteers will take place on the Common.

THE EXECUTIVE MANAGING COMMITTEE'S PROGRAMME.

On Her Majesty's Ship Hero, with His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales on board, being signalled, the Squadron will be met by the Yacht Club, and accompanied by them to the Dockyard. The streets will be lined from the Dockyard Gate by the various Societies in the order of their seniority, as follows, viz:

- The Union Engine and Axe Fire Companies. The North British and Highland Societies. The Charitable Irish Society. The St. Georges' Society. The Carpenters' Charitable Society. The African Society. The Sons of Temperance. The Volunteer Artillery and Rifle Companies. Her Majesty's Forces. The Masonic Body, at their own request, will

be stationed immediately in front of the Masonic Hall, where an Arch will be erected by them.

The Prince on his landing will be received by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, the Major General Commanding the Troops, the Chief Justice and Judges, the President and Members of the Legislative Council, the Speaker and Members of the House of Assembly, the Mayor and Corporation, the Custos and High Sheriff, the Heads of Departments, and the Members of the Executive Managing Committee.

On the procession, which will be formed in the Dockyard, passing out of the Gate, accompanying His Royal Highness (who will make his entree on horse back) the Societies lining the streets will wheel inwards and join the Procession in the foregoing order.

On emerging from the Dockyard Gate, His Royal Highness will pass under a handsome Arch to be erected by the City.

The route of the Procession will be along Water Street, thence through Granville Street to Morton's corner, thence by George Street to Barrington Street, and along Barrington Street to Government House.

Other Ornamental Arches will be placed at suitable positions along the route of the procession, and at the end.

Suitable accommodation will be provided on and adjoining the Grand Parade and in front of St. Paul's Church, for the children of all the schools in the city and in Dartmouth.

A general illumination of the City and of the public buildings will take place on the evening of his (the first) day.

On the morning of the following (being the second) day, His Royal Highness, accompanied by His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, the Earl of St. Germain, His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, the Major General commanding, and the Admiral, with other distinguished persons, will proceed to the Common to a Grand Review of the Troops and Volunteers.

The following will be the route taken by His Royal Highness, namely—from Government House by Barrington Street, to the corner of the old Burying Ground, thence by Spring Garden Road to the Western End of the Horticultural Gardens, thence to the Common.

After the Review, public sports will take place on the Common, under the supervision of a committee.

A Regatta, under the management of the Yacht Club, will also take place on the harbor.

In the evening there will be a display of Fireworks on the Common, and a Grand Ball will be given in the Province Building, of which a separate notice will be published.

His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales will hold a Levée, of which due notice will be given.

The Executive Managing Committee will trust to the good feeling of the public to co-operate with them in carrying out the foregoing programme, and in strictly preserving the order of arrangement, and particularly request that the spectators will refrain from pressing upon the lines of the procession, as any interruption will militate against the general harmony which all parties are interested in maintaining.
