LIVERPOOL.—We learn from the Liverpool Transcript that a serious disturbance took place there on Wednesday week between the crews of two American fishing vessels and some sailors in that port. Guns were brought out by the fishermen but they were taken away from them by the sailors and broken over the heads of the former. Some of the rioters were apprehended and are held to bail to answer at the next term of the Supreme Court.

Societies such as this, and with similar objects, are attached to most of the Institutions of learning in the neighbouring States, while in our own Province, King's College has its Society composed of its Alumni and friends, whose associated efforts have largely contributed to the prosperity of that Institution, and it is hoped that the united operations of the Alumni and friends of Acadia College, will ere long place our Institution on that flourishing basis, so essential to its efficiency and prosperity, and loudly demanded by the growing educational wants of the Province. Those who, have received within its halls the educational training to which, it may be, they are indebted for their success in life, cannot now, for their credit's sake, feel indifferent to the rank this institution is to take amongst similar Seminaries of learning in the Province.
