This valuable Quarterly contains an article of great value on Ecclesiastical Miracles. The writer has treated the subject with much ability. When it is considered the important position that real miracles occupy in the Christian system, it is well worth while to examine the pretended ones which have been attempted to be palmed upon the church in different ages. The opinion is held by many good men that the age of miracles is not yet passed, but that the degeneracy of the church has caused their suspension. We shall be glad at some early day, when we may command time, to give the question some further consideration. The Review is filled with valuable articles and reviews of new publications.

LESSONS AT THE CROSS: by Samuel Hopkins. Seventh Edition. pp. 274. Gould & Lincoln, Boston.

This eminently practical volume, on a subject at all times refreshing to the christian, needs no recommendation. The fact of its passing through seven editions in a comparatively short space of time, shews it to be a superior book. There are few works better adapted to awaken an interest in the great work of the Saviour—rescuing souls from a state of sin and death to one of salvation and holiness.

THE YOUTH'S SCRIPTURE QUESTION BOOK on the New Testament: by H. Hamlin. pp. 166. THE EXPLANATORY QUESTION BOOK. pp. 105. Henry Hoyt, Boston: C. Church-ill, Halifax.

The first of these is a very useful book of questions, answers are also given in some cases. It has fifty-two lessons taken from the gospels, not consecutively, but in the chronological order of "Robinson's Harmony." These lessons are well adapted for giving instruction in Sabbath Schools.

The second is suited to more advanced classes. It consists of fifty lessons on the great doctrines of religion, commencing with "the existence of God," and closing with "Heaven." Each lesson is very conveniently given on two pages: one page with questions and the texts containing answers; the other contains a brief discussion of the doctrine, in the form of "Notes." The question of baptism is omitted, perhaps intentionally. That is surely a defect in a system of instruction in Bible doctrine.

ILLUSTRATIONS OF SCRIPTURE: suggested by a tour through the Holy Land: by H. B. Hackett, D. D., Professor of Biblical Literature in Newton Theological Institute. New and Revised Edition. pp. 354. Gould & Lincoln, Boston.

This valuable work has received abundant commendation since it first made its appearance. The index at the end of the book of the Scripture texts illustrated, renders it an exceedingly desirable companion to the Bible.

The author in his Preface to this new and revised edition, says:—"The language has been corrected, the descriptions are more complete, the passages of Scripture illustrated are more numerous. Additions have been made the result, in part, of a second visit to some of the localities of the Bible. New engravings have been inserted."

No bible student should be without a work of this kind, and we know of none so good, compact, and cheap, as this by Dr. Hackett.

News Summary.

Our last English Mail, which brings London dates to the 15th inst., affords very little of what may properly be called news.

In Parliament very little had been done of importance. The Reform of the Representation was making slow progress, and seems to excite little interest.

Things in Europe were generally quiet, except in the Neapolitan Dominion. A very serious insurrection exists in the Island of Sicily, where severe contests have taken place between the inhabitants and the soldiers. Great atrocities are attributed to the latter. It is probable, however, that quiet will be restored, though not without much bloodshed.

The Carlist insurrection in Spain had been quelled, and General Ortega, the leader, captured and shot. The Carlist claimant of the Crown, Count Montemolin, and his brother had surrendered themselves to the Queen's authority. As they are near relations of Queen Isabella, they will probably be suffered to go at large, provided they relinquish their pretensions to the Spanish succession.
