Merchant's Exchange, June 5, 1860. By the steamship City of Baltimore, off Cape Race, N. F., dates from Liverpool to 31st May are received.

The House of Lords have rejected the common Paper Duty Bill. The decision has excited much attention in and out of Parliament. Majority against the Government, 89.

Lord Lyndhurst and other eminent Peers have asserted their constitutional right to reject the Bill.

Lord Palmerston, in the Commons, has given notice that he will move the appointment of a Committee of that Body to examine for precedents for the course pursued by the Lords.

The Neapolitan troops have been totally defeated near Monreale, which place Garibaldi's troops had invested. It commands Palermo. The Insurgents were gaining strength daily.

It is reported that France and Russia have signed a Treaty relative to the Eastern question.

The Chinese, it is said, have actually refused the ultimatum of France and England. If so, War is the only alternative.
