Memoranda.

BALTIMORE, May 11.—The Br. brig America, Matson, master, from Cienfuegos for Halifax, with a cargo of P. olasses, ashore 20 miles south of Cape Henry. Vessel bilged. Portion of cargo may be saved. May 13th.—Clid. schrs Promoter, Smith, and Susan Lang, both for Hampton Roads, with inward cargo from Halifax, and if not allowed to proceed to Norfolk will return to Halifax. Schr Mary Elizabeth, Sullivan, of and for this port, on Monday last, picked up near Green Island 18 barrels of flour, which are in warehouse. Schr—, Capt. Lennox, of Pubnico, on Saturday picked up about 30 barrels flour in the Bay. In the night, Capt. Lennox descried an object afloat which he supposed to be the body of a man with a life preserver on. He tacked his vessel in order to reach it, but could not find it. We understand the deck of a vessel of 120 to 150 tons—probably that of the Triumph—was seen floating in the Bay two or three days ago. Brig Triumph, cleared at New York, May 1st., for Halifax. The flour picked up in the Bay is supposed to be a portion of her cargo.—Yarmouth Herald, May 16.
