Latest from the States!

BOSTON, Oct. 3.—A doubtful report says Gen. Fremont has been superseded by Gen. Wool, and ordered to Washington for trial by Court Martial.

The Rebels are certainly retreating from the vicinity of Washington and the Federalists advancing.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—Ship Bright arrived from Liverpool, with 108 bales of Cotton.

The Savannah Republican of the 17th ult says that a soldier from Fort Pulaski reports that the engagement between the Lincoln fleet and the Fort at Port Royal commenced on Monday afternoon and continued through all of Tuesday.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Dr. Russell of the London Times arrived here this evening. He was arrested at Wilmington, in the county of that name, in Illinois, for shooting game on the Lord's Day, in contravention of the Sunday law, and fined in fifty-dollars, half of which goes to the school fund.

The war expenditures are now stated, upon Government authority, to be eight and a half millions a week.

Special despatches from Washington state that vessels can no longer pass up or down the Potomac without undergoing a destructive fire from the rebels' batteries and virtually navigation is closed. The Government will take immediate measures to re-open it.

The rebels declare their intention to destroy the war steamship Pensacola, if she attempts to leave the Washington Navy yard for sea.

Contrabands in droves are fleeing from Missouri through Kansas to Nebraska. When known to be the property of Union men they are sent back; but when of secessionists they are helped along.

The Mayor of Leavenworth, Kansas, has issued a proclamation ordering all the stores in the city to close from four to half past six o'clock in the afternoon, for the purpose of giving all persons time to perfect themselves in the use of firearms.

A company of infantry has been tendered to the Government from the Hawaiian Islands, and accepted. It consists of American emigrants and native Hawaiians. It is expected to come as soon as the news of the acceptance reaches the islands.

St. George's Island in Boston harbor has been chosen as a place of confinement for political prisoners, who are increasing to an uncomfortable extent.

Four days later from Europe!

The steamship Bavaria from Southampton, was intercepted off Cape Race, at 10 o'clock on Saturday evening.

The Kings of Denmark and Holland will visit Napoleon at Compeigne, Oct. 6th, at the same time with the King of Prussia.

Saxony does not object to commercial treaty with France, but agrees perfectly with Prussia on this question.

ITALY.—A ship laden with arms, believed to be destined to fit out an expedition in Umbria against the Papal provinces, was seized.

JAPAN.—An attempt was made at Kawagawa by armed assassins, on July 5th, to murder the inmates of the British Legation. Two of the miscreants were wounded, the rest escaped. All was quiet on July 21.

TURKEY.—Omar Pacha, is concentrating his forces at Trebigne.

GREECE.—The miscreant who attempted to assassinate the Queen, was a young student named Darios.

It is stated that Lord Monck is to leave England by the Canadian steamship sailing on the 3rd October, and that Sir Edmund Head will leave immediately on his successor's arrival. Before leaving, Sir Edmund will give a grand ball in the Parliament House.

Hon. A. Gordon, the newly appointed Governor of New Brunswick, was to leave Liverpool on the 5th inst.
