Gold.

The discovery of Gold in Nova Scotia at the present day is not in the least to be wondered at. Every week brings new tidings to our ears of the precious metal being discovered in different parts of the Province. The excitement caused by the daily rumours of the discovery of gold is now most intense. The farmer has become so excited, that he now leaves his farm, deprives himself of the comforts of home, and the enjoyment of filling his barns with the produce of the tilled soil, without which gold would be of no value to him, and all the farming utensils are housed, save the pick and the shovel, which are taken for the purpose of procuring that which we hear almost hourly sounding in our ears, from the lips of every person we meet—GOLD. The mechanic has thrown his tools down as something of no value, and naught attracts his eye but something in the ground of a yellow cast. It is said that new diggings have been discovered in Economy, Colchester Co. Many men have already arrived at the spot, where the quartz has been found. The prospect is said to be excellent, though it is now but a few days since the discovery was first made. It has caused great excitement in this little town.
