THE LATE PRISONERS IN CHINA.—A feuilleton in the Moniteur, gives some details of the tortures to which some of the prisoners in China were exposed before their death. M. D'Escayrac de Lature, Chief of the French Scientific Mission in China, escaped death almost by a miracle; three times he was on the point of execution, and some red-buttoned mandarins gave orders for a bed of straw to be laid in the middle of the court, "in order that the blood of the barbarian might not sully the soil." The approachof the allies frightened the executioners. After having beaten the prisoner with their fists and with the flat of their sabres, he was tied with cords, his legs bent up to his chest, his arms against the legs, the hands and feet bound together, and wooden wedges driven between the flesh and the ropes. All the prisoners, bound in the same manner, were placed in carts with the points of nails sticking up, and were driven in them over rutty roads. After travelling in that way for twenty-four hours, they arrived at Pekin, and were driven five hours through the streets in the midst of an immense concourse of people, whose rage could with difficulty be restrained; after which they were placed in the prison of the city, separated from each other, and chained in a room amidst thieves and murderers. M. D'-Escayrac remained in a cell until the Chinese became thoroughly terrified by the victories of the allies, and released him.
