

Just at day break, the neighbors were aroused by a bright flame proceeding from the back of the premises. Before help could be obtained the high wind had blown the flames from the outhouse to the dwelling-house, and the inmates had barely time to escape before the whole was in flames, losing all their farming utensils, carriages, clothes, furniture, &c., except what was in one of the rooms.
