PROSPECTUS

A NEW SEMI-WEEKLY JOURNAL.

WITH the beginning of the year 1862, the undersigned proposes commencing the publication of a new Semi-weekly newspaper, to be devoted to Politics, Literature, Agriculture, Commercial, and General Intelligence.

As to its political tone, the undersigned will only say to those who have been in the habit of reading the Acadian Recorder, that the new journal will conform in its general tone to that which characterized the Recorder during the eight years—nearly—in which the latter was under his editorial management. In the management of the new journal he will, however, be more free to act in accordance with his own ideas of editorial judiciousness. On this head, he will only say further, and for the information of the general public, that the substantial interests of the British American Colonies, rather than the petty squabbles of local factions, in which the public welfare is not materially involved, will receive the most constant consideration and careful discussion; and that whilst, in what relates to disputes between rival political parties, it is not promised that neutrality will ever be the policy pursued, every effort will be made to maintain always an attitude of strict independence and impartiality; and that, whilst no party will receive a blind support, towards none will there be exhibited a factious opposition.

In the other departments of the projected journal, every possible pains will be taken to make it combine instruction with amusement for both the town and country reader; to furnish the latest news, both foreign and domestic, down to the hour of publication; to make the paper a reliable medium for commercial intelligence; and to render it worthy the commendation and support of the general reader. It is proposed to issue the paper every Wednesday and Saturday evening. It will be printed on a sheet somewhat larger than that of any of the tri-weekly papers published in Halifax; and will contain more reading matter per week than is now furnished by any journal published in Nova Scotia. The subscription money will be fifteen shillings a year, if paid in advance, or within three months from the commencement of the year; twenty shillings, if not paid until after the expiration of three months.

SABBATH SCHOOL STUDIES ON THE LIFE OF CHRIST, First and Second Grade, by Rev. W. S. McKenzie.—Price 10 Cents each.

The object of the Author in preparing these Books was to have a book where his whole Sabbath School could have the same subject before them. He therefore prepared two sets of Questions, one for the smaller portion of the School, and one for the older. After using them in his own School and proving them a perfect success, he corrected them, and now they are presented to the public.

The subject is also continued in a second volume making a complete History of Christ. The Watchman and Reflector says, in announcing the work: "The books are original in their theme and design; their subject being the Biography of Christ, presented in an attractive, connected chronological history. The design is to have the same subject studied by the whole School at the same time. Hence, there are two books, of the first and second grade, containing the same number of lessons. Each lesson in each book is on precisely the same portion of scripture; so that scholars in the primary department are going over the same ground as the advanced classes. There are evident advantages in having the whole School studying the same topic and portion of scripture."

"With this, teacher's meetings will offer inducements for the attendance of all the teachers; and when the Superintendent questions the School on the lesson, the youngest as well as the oldest feels an interest in the exercise; and also, when at home the lesson is studied, the young as well as the old in the family will be upon the same theme. The conception of the author is a happy one, and his design carried out must be highly acceptable."

From Prof. H. B. Hackett, of Newton Institution.—I have examined some of the pages of Rev. Mr. McKenzie's Question Books on the Life of the Saviour. I regard the plan of the work (which differs quite materially from that of any similar work) as excellent, the questions as eminently judicious and well suited to interest and instruct the learner. It cannot fail to prove a welcome and useful auxiliary to the cause of Sabbath School instruction.
