ANOTHER FIRE IN HALIFAX -An alarm of fire aroused our city yesterday morning about 3 o'clock. On repairing to the spot we found the flames proceeding from Doran's stables, at the back of the Country Market, in Sackville Street. The buildings around being very old, soon ignited. Before the engines could be got to work, the fire had taken possession of R. Fraser's Auction-rcom and other adjoining houses. It continued burning until it had consumed ten or twelve houses, including Doran's house and store, Tupper's Boarding-house, the Market, Fraser's store, Brick dwelling-house, Jenkin's dwelling and A. Troop's watch-maker, &c., &c. A number of small families were driven out of their dwellings, and doubtless lost a large portion of their effects. It is said that two horses were burnt in the stable. It was some time before the steam-fire engines could be brought to play upon the flames, but as soon as they began, proved very effective in preventing the further progress of the destructive element.
