

THE VICTORIA ELECTION will come off to-day. Mr. Kidston did not nominate Mr. Campbell, but spoke at the hustings in his favor. Nomination day passed off quietly. Both parties were confident of success.

THE NEW REPRESENTATION BILL, laid on the table of the House of Assembly by the Hon. Mr. Howe, is very short. It may probably be filled up next session. The Morning Chronicle gives the following as a copy of it:—

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council, and Assembly as follows:—

- 1. Hereafter the Counties of Lunenburg, Queens, Shelburne, Yarmouth, Digby, Annapolis, Cumberland and Inverness shall be represented by one County and two district members.
2. The Counties of Kings, Hants, Colchester and Pictou shall be divided into two Ridings, to be represented by two members each.
3. The City of Halifax shall be represented by two members; and the County of Halifax, outside the limits of the city, shall be divided into two Ridings, to be represented by one member each, and by one County member.
4. The Counties of Sydney, Guysborough, Richmond, Cape Breton and Victoria shall be represented by two members each.

A genuine American bald eagle, a bird rarely seen in this Province, was shot a few days ago at Cole harbour, by a Mr. Gamon. It was an immense bird, with most formidable beak and talons, measuring nearly nine feet between the extremities of its wings.—Sun.

It has been suggested that this was the American eagle, and had left the U. States in disgust.

The handsome Organ, imported by Mr. Dellatore for the Sons of Temperance Division Room, was set up by Mr. J. C. Craigen on Friday last. It is a beautiful instrument. We believe it is intended to hold a musical entertainment shortly by way of inaugurating it.—Jb.

THE MINUDIE ESTATE.—We understand that Amos Seaman, Esq., the proprietor of the well known Minudie Estate, in the County of Cumberland, has determined to sell a number of farms to suit purchasers. As the Minudie Estate consists of some seven thousand acres of upland, a portion of which is in a high state of cultivation, surrounded by three thousand acres of prime Dyke, and all delightfully situated at the Head of the Bay of Fundy, we can imagine no more eligible situation for any person desiring to purchase a good farm. We are informed that the quantity of land will be made to suit purchasers, and the terms such as will leave no ground for complaint. Minudie is within eight miles of Amherst by the ferry, and but a couple of hours sail from Sackville, N. B., and but nine miles from the Joggins Coal Mines.—Colonist.

New Brunswick.

SAD CASE OF DROWNING.—A man named William Davidson, a resident of Berwick, N. S., and Postmaster at that place, was found drowned at the Market Wharf, on Tuesday morning. The deceased was on his way to the States, but missed the American boat on Monday morning. He had a considerable quantity of money with him, about \$200 having been found loose in his pockets when picked up. Mr. Davidson had a wife and four children in Berwick, and his remains were conveyed thither last night in the Emperor.—Col. Empire.

The New Brunswickers have manufactured and shipped a quantity of cloth to the United States for the use of the Federal troops.

NEW BAPTIST CHAPEL.—The Marsh Bridge Baptist Church of this city are about proceeding with the erection of a new place of worship in connection with that Church. The site purchased is in Leinster Street, opposite the Reservoir. The builder of St. Mary's Chapel, Waterloo St. has taken the contract.—Watchman.

A NEW COLONY IN NEW BRUNSWICK.—The barque Irvine, of Yarmouth (N.S.) 500 tons register, now lying in Victoria Harbor, has been chartered to carry 150 agricultural emigrants to Glassville, a new district granted for colonization purposes by government, and situated about 150 miles from the river St. John, N.B. It is a rich pastoral district, and has been named after the Rev. Mr. Glass, who is now in this country promoting the emigration movement.—Greenock Advertiser.

THE RAILWAY.—The "Morning News" says: Since the running of the steamer from Shediac to Miramichi, immense quantities of goods purchased in this City, have passed over the Railway for the Northern counties. On Saturday evening five Cars filled with freight, the most of it for Miramichi, left St. John.

An additional wing is about to be built to the Lunatic Asylum, St. John.

THE HON. CHARLES FISHER has resigned the office of Attorney General, and it is expected that the Hon. Albert J. Smith, of Dorchester, will be appointed in his stead. Mr. Smith, though for many years a member of the Government, has not heretofore accepted office. The Hon. Peter Mitchell has accepted a seat in the Legislative Council, retaining his position as a member of the Government.—Col. Press.

OPENING OF NAVIGATION.—Steamboat communication on the different routes of travel is now complete. The "Union Line," to which the "Antelope" has been lately added, now ply regularly on the River St. John as far as Woodstock. There is every prospect of a good business this season.—Watchman.

EXPENSES OF THE PRINCE'S VISIT.—A bill passed both branches of the Legislature at the last Session, to authorize the Common Council to levy an assessment of \$3,000 upon the City to repay money borrowed from one of the Banks, on the occasion of the Prince's visit. Through some oversight, this bill was not among those to which His Excellency gave his assent at the close of the Session, and therefore, the assessment cannot be made this year.—Col. Empire.

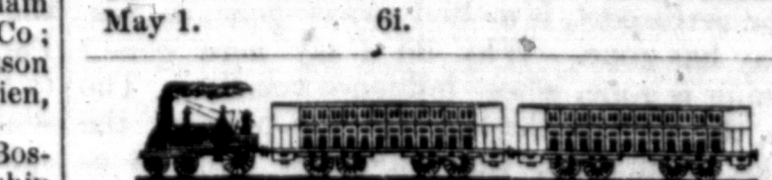
