

go in with other bodies, holding what they believed to be error and so lost much of the influence for good they might otherwise accomplish.

Tuesday Morning was occupied with the routine business of the Convention.

The President of the Associated Alumni J. W. Johnston Junr. Esqr., informed the Convention that that body had passed a resolution to devote their funds towards sustaining a Professor's Chair in Acadia College and that if the necessary amount were raised for that purpose they proposed inviting the Rev Dr. Pryor to accept their nomination to the Board of Governors.

The next session of the Convention is to be held with the church at Moncton, New Brunswick on the 10th of August 1862.

The meeting was closed by singing the Union Hymn. A more harmonious-session of this body has perhaps never before been held. We regret that a larger representation from New Brunswick was not present, and hope that the brethren had a plesanter passage across the Bay than when they came, or than they did on returning from Sackville last year.

We were glad to hear that our word of exhortation a week or two since "about the Convention" was accepted. The spirit there recommended was very generally manifested and we trust may continue to animate the brethren when they return to the localities in which they labor.

The statements made by the Rev. S. T. Rand in a late communication under the caption "Impudence once more," have not escaped the eye of our contemporary the editor of the Presbyterian Witness. He publishes the whole story about the Rev. W. Elder, as a "curious bit of history," and makes the same remark as we did in reference to it. "It will be new to most of our readers." We think it would have been more fair and honorable if the editor had given the resolution on the subject passed by the Association, now 26 years ago, and had stated the fact that although Mr. R. himself was present at the Association, yet the vote was nevertheless a unanimous one!!

Since the publication of Mr. R's letter we have learned some other things in reference to this case, not stated by Mr. Rand, which we think would fully justify the action taken respecting it. The attempt to bring a charge of popish intolerance against Baptists for a simple act of church discipline, is, we think, a piece of absurdity. We gave insertion to the letter, and made the remarks appended to it under the impression that our intelligent readers would compare those facts with Mr. R's statements and thus be preserved from any noxious influence.

We did not suppose that Mr. R's letter would be used for such purpose as we here find it has been applied to, and shall bear this in mind in future.

Absence from home last week prevented our attending to our neighbour of the Morning Chronicle. On the 24th ult. he had a long article on "The Baptists of New Brunswick." He seems to have been troubled because in our issue of July 24th, in referring to the Fredericton University affairs and the remarks of the Christian Watchman on the resolution offered by the Rev. S. Robinson of St. John, N. B., we were not disposed to go into the party political aspects of the question. We have no desire to participate in the unhappy strife caused by the introduction of this element into the religious journals of our brethren over the Bay.

In our article we gave all that was necessary to shew the educational features of the affair, without mixing ourselves up in other things with which we had nothing to do.

Because we did this our contemporary says we "emasculated and garbled the Watchman's article." The Watchman makes no complaint, and we fancy the editor of that paper is quite capable of defending himself, and will not thank the Chronicle for interfering in the matter.

Our readers would not desire us to be boring them from week to week with such small matters as form the staple of some of our contemporaries. Our institutions must not be sacrificed to the personal aggrandizement of party politicians. Those who sustain them do so for far higher purposes, as our neighbor of the Chronicle was informed not long since by one who knew.

The Morning Chronicle's old affection for the Christian Visitor appears to have departed. He seems to have transferred his smiles to its younger rival the Christian Watchman. Brother DeMill may be able to supply him with an occasional crumb of comfort by way of return for these marks of his approbation. His efforts to instruct us in Baptist principles we trust may be rewarded. For our own part we have nothing to do with the political predilections of our brethren, I. E.

Bill and E. B. DeMill, the editors of the two papers—rival candidates for the representation of the Baptists of New Brunswick. We hope neither of them will allow themselves to be made use of for party purposes, but that they will soon be enabled to work on in harmony in behalf of the great objects to which they have consecrated themselves. This we think they might do and yet maintain the independence which has ever characterized our brethren in New Brunswick.
