No change appears to have taken place in Italy, Austria or Hungary. This latter country is in fact in a state of unarmed rebellion.

General Intelligence.

DOMESTIC.

The SUPREME COURT commenced its October sittings on Tuesday last. For the first time the two Court-rooms were occupied simultaneously.
