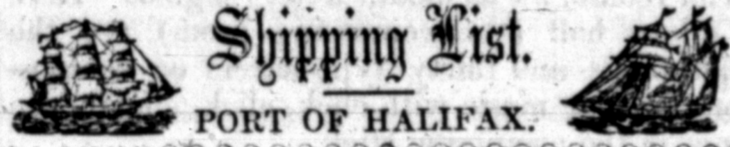
Deaths.

The Governor in Council having fixed the 30th day of March next, as the time for taking a Census of Nova Scotia, in accordance with the Act of the Legislature, and a Board of Statistics having been formed under the provision of the said Act, the following form of Householder's Schedule has been prepared by the Board, and is now published for the information of the public. A copy of this Schedule will be placed in the hands of every head of a family in the Province, previous to the 30th of March next, by enumerators appointed for each Polling District. On the 30th of March, each head of a family will fill up the Schedule left with him, according to the instructions accompanying it; and as soon as possible thereafter, the Schedules will be again collected by the enumerators, and returned to this office.
