

Latest from Europe!

The Steamship Scotia arrived at New York on the 21st from Liverpool, with news to the 11th Inst., bringing 138 passengers.

Mr. Layard stated in the House of Commons, in response to an enquiry, that, so far as the Government knew, Count Mercier's visit to Richmond was without instructions from France, and was attended with no political result whatever.

The Paris correspondent of the new Confederate organ, the Index, published in London, asserts that Mercier was certainly under instruction to ascertain certain points, and will report in person to the Emperor.

The Independence Belge asserts that the object of Lavalette's recent visit to London was to induce England to consent to common intervention in America, and England, agreed, on condition that the Roman question was first settled.

Mr. Bright deprecated hasty statements as to the termination of the war in America, discontinuance of the blockade, &c., by Ministers, as most disastrous to commerce in Lancashire.

The Times regards the new slave trade treaty as the first fruits of secession; but says it is not a blow as the South, but a victory over the North.

The Paris correspondent of the Morning Herald says it is beyond question that a reorganization of the South is seriously contemplated by the French Government.

Rumors of the approaching solution of the Roman question are becoming more and more general.

It is reported that the Papal Government are prepared for a sudden departure.

The ex-King of Naples has left Rome. His destination is unknown.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The marble elephants which stood in the Kaiser Bazar at Lucknow, and which were removed from there a short time since, are en route for England, as an offering to the Empress of India.

At the present time there are not less than 535 charitable societies existing in London alone; and a sum of nearly two millions of money is annually spent by them; while the probable amount of alms distributed altogether is not less than three millions and a half sterling.

On Monday April 28th Her Majesty, accompanied by their Royal Highnesses Prince Alfred, Princess Alice, Princess Helena, Princess Louise, and Princess Beatrice, left Osborne for Windsor.

DISTRESS IN MANCHESTER has already caused two meetings, one of masters and the other of men. That of the masters was much divided in opinion as to the amount of the distress.

SEA FIGHTS IN FUTURE.—Earl Hardwicke when speaking in the House of Lords, on the coast defences said—"The time would arrive when a ship would be fought by an engineer, a stoker, and an artilleryman."

THE JEWELS AT THE INTERNATIONAL EXHIBITION are said to be inconceivably splendid. The Koh-i-noor is there, but not alone in its glory, for a great rival, said to be worth a million sterling, has come in from Amsterdam.
