General Intelligence.

DOMESTIC.

GOLD.—"A Miner" writes to the Eastern Chronicle a detailed account of the work done at Goldenville by the Pictou crusher in two months, up to Nov. 13th. By the crushing of 182 tons 19 cwt. of quartz, there was obtained 393 ozs. 15 dwts. 2 grs. The aggregate amount crushed by that crusher being 455 tons 15 cwt., yielding 1180 ozs; 5 dwts. 17 grs. In addition to this he estimates that about 965 ounces have been obtained by other crushers, washings, &c. This quantity, at \$19 per ounce, would give a sum of \$40,000, considerably more than has been expended in mining operations there. He anticipates that thousands of men will be employed in future years there, and that the prospect for Goldenville is very promising.

A bar of Gold, valued at \$1,000, was received by W. & C. Silver from the Waverly diggings. This is said to be the result of but two weeks work. Some refuse quartz, about 5 tons, from which all the "sights" had been taken, yielded 2 ounces, and another lot of 1 1/2 ton yielded 30zs. 4dwts.

BRIDGETOWN.—Rev. Geo. Armstrong lectured before the Bridgetown Literary Association on "Self-Improvement" to a crowded audience. Dr. Chipman was announced as the next lecturer.

The Roman Catholics in Halifax are holding Revival Services—a mission of Paulist Fathers. The inhabitants have been waked up by the chiming of the St. Mary's bells between 4 and 5 o'clock in the morning, for some days past.

ROBBERY.—We learn from the Colonist of Thursday last that on Wednesday evening between 6 and 7 while the person in charge of the Jeweller's establishment on Buckingham street, in the same building with the Recorder printing office, was absent for a short time, a pane of glass in the front window was broken, and several articles of jewelry stolen.

HOMICIDE IN COLCHESTER.—We learn that a man named Crawford was shot by another named Crow, at or near Truro, a few days ago, and has since died from the effects. The charge entered the leg below the knee. Amputation was twice performed, but ineffectually.—Crow had been committed to jail to await his trial.—The quarrel was the too common one of land dispute.—lb.

Prince Edward Island.

The Hon. Henry Allan Johnson, has been appointed a member of the P. E. Island Government, vice T. H. Haviland, resigned.

From Ross's Weekly we learn that for two or three years past the prospects of dealers in grain on P. E. Island, have not been so good as this year. In consequence, the farmers are obtaining good prices for both Barley and Oats. The Oat Crop has been at least fifty per cent. better, between quality and quantity, this year, than it was last season.

A Cargo of 12,000 bushels Oats, and 500 barrels Potatoes, are being shipped at Hickey's Wharf, for New Orleans, direct, by Mr. I. C. Hall. It is likely to be a paying speculation, as the prices of produce at the above market is high.

A contract with the United States is now being filled on the Island, by a firm, for 50,000 bushels of Oats, to be put in bags. \$2,400 worth of gunny bags have already been filled ready for shipment.

PRODUCE TO EUROPE.—Quite a number of new vessels have recently sailed from this port, for Europe, laden with the produce of the country; others are in port loading; and there are several not yet launched that are bound to ports in Europe, Newfoundland, &c.—Islander.

New Brunswick.

ROBBERY.—A man named Mason Pineo belonging to Kentville N. S., was robbed of over \$141 at Campbell's hotel, Charlotte street, St. John, on Sunday night; a young man named Eldridge Barnaby was arrested near Hampton, charged with being the guilty party. They both belong to Nova Scotia.

The Steamer New England, on her trip from St. John to Boston, last week, had 387 passengers, and yesterday morning she had to all appearances between 350 and 400. A large proportion of these are young men, attracted to the United States by the demand for labour.—Globe.

The Rev. Mr. Hall was advertized to preach in aid of the Fund for the relief of the distressed in the Cotton districts, at German St. Baptist Church last Lord's day evening. Subject, "England: her Laws, her Literature, and her Religion; and the necessity of Colonial liberality in her distress."

FRUIT GROWING.—The St. John Globe predicts that a very few years will prove that the interior of New Brunswick is even superior as a fruit raising country to Nova Scotia.

AN INCENDIARY.—A man named Joseph McNeill formerly a policeman of St. John has been charged with setting fire to his own house which was insured. He has been committed for trial.

Produce is selling unprecedented low rates in the St. John markets.

The Lancashire Fund at St. John has reached about \$6,000.

FREDERICTON.—There is good sleighing at Fredericton. In consequence of the swollen state of the river it has not yet closed, but navigation has ceased for the winter.

Mr. Raymond, M. P. P., for Victoria is dead.

A large number of ancient coins have been found at the Magdalen Islands.

Canada.

Elibu Burritt, the learned blacksmith, is lecturing in Upper Canada.

INSULT TO THE BRITISH FLAG.—Mr. Morison, the barrister who defended the murderer Mawn at Montreal and who holds the rank of Major in the militia has been charged by Col. Peacock, of the 16th Regiment, with insulting the Queen through the colors of that regiment. In his defence of Mawn, Morison ironically advised that the name of John Mawn should be inscribed on their banner—now as maiden as those of the Hochelaga Rifles. This insult to the colors is, according to military law, a very grave offence, liable to severe punishment; and the charges which have been forwarded to his Excellency the Governor General, have been prepared by Col. Peacock with a view of having Mr. Morison dismissed from the active service. It is denied, however, that he can be held responsible under military rule for any statement made in his civil official capacity.—Globe.

"A FOOL AND HIS MONEY ARE SOON PARTED."—A well-known resident of Toronto Canada, who visited Windsor a few days ago, formed the acquaintance of two blacklegs, who proposed a pleasant game of cards, and before rising, relieved him of \$250 in Canada funds. Detroit Advertiser.

A LESSON TO CORPORATIONS.—The Montreal Corporation has been mulcted in damages to the extent of \$26,000, by the Supreme Court, for losses resulting from fire caused by a mob, which occurred on the 12th of July, 1857. Every citizen should be reminded that in the event of loss accruing to parties through wrongdoing on the part of the populace, the damage must be paid for by the rate-payers generally, and indiscriminately, without respect to persons.—Journal.
