FRANCE.

There are rumours of fresh efforts being made by the French Government to bring about mediation in America.

ITALY.

We are assured on the authority of La France that the Government of Russia and Prussia have "in the interests of peace," adopted towards Italy a similar policy to that of France.

The Italian Chamber of Deputies opened its session on Wednesday. Though the debate has continued day by day, Ratazzi has not yet made his promised "exposition."

The Morning Post's correspondent at Rome, speaking of financial difficulties of the Papal Government, says it is surmised, and not improbably that, if all other sources should fail, the French Government will not hesitate to supply his Holiness with the pecuniary means of carrying on his regime.
