I hope that the new year will be more favourable to Kings and to peoples." To the Senate the Emperor said :- "It is always with pleasure that I receive from the Senate the assurances of devotion of which you are the mouthpiece, and I count upon it to assist me in perfecting the Constitution, at the same time maintaining intact the fundamental bases upon which it rests. In reply to the address of the Legislative body -"" I feel deeply what you have just expressed. The Legislative Body will, I trust, see in the modifications which I have introduced into the Constitution a new proof of my confidence in its Intelligence and patriotism." The Archbishop of Paris complimented his Majesty in the name of the clergy. The Emperor replied :-- " I am always much moved by the prayers which you address to Heaven for the Empress, for my son and for me. The French clergy, so eminent by its piety and virtues, who know that they must render to God that which is God's, and to Cæsar that which is Cæsar's, may count, you may assure them, upon my protection and my lively sympathy.'

#### ITALY.

Turin, Jan. 7.- A reactionary movement has taken place at Castellamare, in Sicily.

Troops have been despatched from Palermo to the scene of the disturbances.

The population of Palermo is very excited, and has offered to co-operate with the Gove. nment in the suppression of the movement.

The Pope held his customary reception of French officers on New Year's Day, and with the same kind of verbal ceremony with which it has been accompanied on previous occasions.

Notwithstanding the "devotion" of General Goyon and the French officers to the Pope, there are unmistakeable signs of disagreement between the French and Roman authorities. The French soldiers have been directed to garrison Alatri, a small town on the Papal frontier, and Cardinal Antonelli strongly opposes the movement. He declares that the place must be occupied by force, if it is occupied at all.

At length the railway communication between Rome and the late Kingdom of Naples is completed. On Sunday week a train started from the "eternal city," and traversed the entire line to Ceprano, on the Neapolitan frontier, exciting the liveliest interest in the population all the way. The new railway, formed after being so long objected to by the Papal Government, will prove Enoch Bishop, in the 19th year of his age. His afan immense advantage to foreign travellers, as flicted parents mourn his loss, but not without hope.



The Chambers at Athens had voted a sum of 10,000 drachmas to relieve the sufferers by this catastrophe.


