EDUCATIONAL.—At a meeting of the Board of Education, held in St. John on the 11th inst., the following Explanation and Orders were made:—

Explanation.—The accommodation required in the case of Superior Schools must be such as to ensure in the principal School-room one hundred and fifty cubic feet of air to each pupil, not only on the average during the Term, but on each and every day of it.

Orders.—1. The average daily attendance at Schools in which an Assistant Teacher is employed must be at least forty pupils of six years of age or upwards, to entitle both Teachers to the Provincial Allowance. 2. That in future, not more than forty Pupil-Teachers will be received at the Training School in each Term, of whom not more than twenty-five may be females. If a larger number than forty apply for admission, the applicants will be admitted according to the date of application.

Latest from Europe! FRANCE.

The Paris Moniteur of Thursday published two important despatches on the Roman question, with a view of making known the efforts which Louis Napoleon had made to effect a reconciliation between Italy and the Holy See.

Public opinion at Paris continues to be very much occupied with the Roman question. The letter of the Emperor, and the other documents published in the Moniteur, have been discussed in all their numerous phases, and very varied and conflicting inferences have been drawn from the official utterances.

The thousandth-year's jubilee of the foundation of the Russian empire was celebrated at Novgorod on the 19th ult. with immense ceremony.

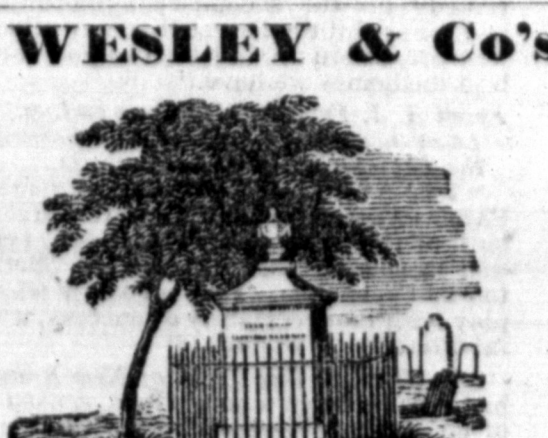
