

The London correspondent of the Toronto Leader pays the following compliment to the skill and taste which characterizes the Nova Scotia Department of the International Exhibition:

"Nova Scotia and New Brunswick also finished their arrangements in time, and now present a very pretty appearance, the courts being laid out with great taste and care. The former particularly, is remarkable for the skill with which a beautiful tout ensemble is given by the judicious employment of a little artistic taste, in placing the articles exhibited according to their color, size and general similarity."

EXTRAORDINARY INVESTIGATION AT CHELTENHAM.—During the last few days some extraordinary facts have come to light relative to the death of a gentleman who died in the immediate vicinity of Cheltenham some three or four years since, leaving large legacies to various personal friends and acquaintances. The deceased, it was supposed at the time, had died suddenly from heart disease, but from circumstances that have since transpired, an investigation of a private nature has taken place. It is said that application will forthwith be made to the Secretary of State for an order to have the body exhumed, prior to an analysis being made.

EXTRAORDINARY ESCAPE AT A REVIEW.—At a meeting of the East Riding Militia, a day or two ago, at Westwood, Beverly, one of the spectators of their evolutions had a miraculous escape from death. A private named Harrington neglected after loading his rifle to remove his ramrod, and on the firearm being discharged, the rod was shot away and struck a man named Bartle. Fortunately the end of the rod came in contact with a double-cased silver watch Bartle had in his waistcoat pocket. The watch was shattered to atoms, but to the resistance it offered, its owner was indebted for the safety of his life, as from the force with which the rod struck him there is no doubt that it would have penetrated his body had not the watch warder it off. The rod when picked up was found to have been bent into a zigzag form by the force of the collision. Bartle did not suffer beyond feeling an acute pain in the side for a short period.

AGRARIAN CRIME IN IRELAND.—The progress of agrarian crime in Ireland is exciting the most serious alarm throughout the agricultural districts of that country. The recent murders of Mr. McGuire, M. Thiebault, and Mr. Fitzgerald, have been followed by a series of threatening notices, which may well strike terror into the families of those who have received them. On Wednesday, Mr. D. F. Leahy and Mr. W. Galgox, of Cork, and their wives, received letters of the most diabolical character, and on Thursday, similar letters were received by Mr. Bianconi, of Longfield; Mr. Cardon of Bernane; Mr. Beanish, agent for Captain Barry, of Middleton; and Mr. R. Phillips. It is evident that extraordinary efforts will have to be made to suppress this fearful conspiracy, and with the present feeling amongst the upper and middle classes of Ireland, the authorities may confidently rely upon the hearty co-operation of those classes in the steps which must be taken. Last Friday seven persons were arrested and taken before the magistrates on suspicion of sending letters to Mr. Leahy. On the application of the prosecution they were remanded for eight days.

THE LATE CALAMITY IN HOLLAND.—The fearful calamity which has recently occurred to Enschede can now be estimated at its real importance. Seventeen-twentieths of the town have become a mass of ruins, and about four thousand persons are homeless and penniless. A great portion of the property was uninsured, but the machinery employed in the manufacturing was chiefly insured in English offices. The distress of the burned-out operatives is very great, but liberal subscriptions of money and contributions of clothing are being sent in. A vast number of tents have been erected in the adjoining fields for the temporary accommodation of the homeless. The report that the fire was caused by lightning is incorrect; it is believed to have been the work of an incendiary. In any case a man has been arrested on grave suspicion of having set fire to his own house for some ulterior purpose. Only one manufactory has escaped destruction, and the damage is estimated at upwards of a million sterling. Almost all the books and papers of value have been destroyed, owing to the worthlessness of the fire-proof safes employed. Several persons are missing, and it is feared they have been suffocated in the smoke. One hundred thousand guilders have been forwarded to the relief committee from the sub-committees formed in the different cities of the kingdom.
