

Council to sell a portion of the Halifax Common in order to enable the Council to extend Park Street.

Mr. Donkin, reported a bill for the protection of the River Fisheries, with amendments.

Dr. Tupper presented a petition from the Medical Society, praying the House to pass an act for the Registry of Births, Marriages and Deaths.

The Fin. Secretary laid on the table a statement of the liabilities of the Province on 31st Dec.; also a list of the breaches of the revenue up to the end of 1861; also, a memorandum of expenses not included in the estimate.

The objected items reserved from the committee of supply were taken up.

A discussion arose as to the sum of \$1250 being voted to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor for his private Secretary; Dr. Tupper argued that although they could not without a special Act of the Province interfere with the Salaries of the Lieutenant Governor or Judges yet he thought this sum might be very properly struck out of the Estimate, and he thought the salary of His Excellency ample to meet such demand and, after the action already taken by the House, opposition to such retrenchment should be withdrawn.

Hon. Prov. Sec. did not admit that the Government had been defeated and contended that the sum should be met as usual.

The vote was taken and carried 25 to 21. The next reserved item was that for Legislative Expenses—Dr. Tupper moved that the Members of both Houses receive £50 each for the session which would effect a saving to the province of \$10,000.

After several members had spoken the question was put and lost 25 to 22.

A message from the Legislative Council informed the House that they had agreed to the Gold Bill without amendment.

The House adjourned to Monday.

MONDAY, March 31st.

Dr. Tupper (in the absence of Mr. Esson) introduced a bill in reference to certain police regulations in the town of Dartmouth.

Hon. Mr. Wier presented a petition from the N. S. Electric Telegraph Co., against the passage of a bill before the House.

Several bills were reported from committees.

A sum of money due to Messrs. King for postage service was considered and referred to the P. O. Committee.

At 2 o'clock His Excellency attended in the Legislative Council Chamber to give his assent to the Gold Bill and 27 other Bills.

Mr. Longley moved that the bill to amend the License Law be taken up and gave explanations of the several clauses. The bill is substantially the same as that agreed to by the House last year, but rejected by the Legislative Council.

The 5th Clause provides that the Sessions in any county where no licenses are granted may appoint an Agent or Agents to sell alcoholic liquors for medicinal, mechanical, and other purposes, not inconsistent with the Act.

Some discussion arose on the motion to prevent magistrates from having a license to sell intoxicating liquors.

Mr. Blanchard moved that no Alderman for the City of Halifax, Members of the Assembly, or Legislative Council, or Justice of the Peace shall hold a tavern, shop, or general license.

Dr. Tupper moved to add to Mr. B's amendment, "or shall be in any way engaged in the traffic in intoxicating liquors." This would have excluded wholesale dealers as well as keepers of common liquor shops from the City Council and Legislature.

Mr. Blanchard withdrew his motion and the clause passed without amendment.

After passing several clauses and attempts being made to amend some of the others, it was agreed to adjourn the debate.

Hon. Prov. Sec. said there would be 2000 copies of the Gold Bill and the Joint Stock Companies Bill printed for sale.

Hon. Mr. Johnston spoke of the extension of the Savings Bank system to country towns.

Hon. Prov. Sec. had made enquiries when in England and had advised Mr. Woodgate the Post Master General to correspond with parties in England on the subject.

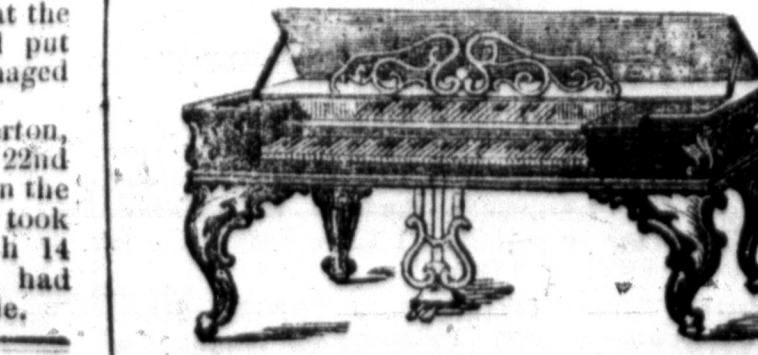
