

European News.

FRANCE.

The French Minister of Instruction and Worship has issued a circular, addressed to the prefects of departments, enjoining them to warn the heads of religious institutions against the practice of receiving young children and training them up as Roman Catholics without sufficient regard for the wishes and authority of the parents.

ITALY.

It is reported in Paris that an attempt has been made on the life of General Goyon, in Rome, and that one of his aides-de-camp received a couple of poignant wounds. If this be true it is a circumstance much to be regretted, as in no way can it serve the purposes of Italian unity.

PORTUGAL.

The Portuguese Legislature has appointed a medical commission to examine and report upon the sanitary condition of the royal palaces, and the King has removed his residence from the fatal abode which his family so recently inhabited.

INDIA AND CHINA.

The accounts from India by this mail are the most cheering that have reached us for a long period. The harvest is said to be splendid, the revenue flourishing, wages rising, and improvements everywhere.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Lady Franklin, the widow of the great Arctic navigator, has been visiting the Sandwich Islands in the Pacific Ocean.

The Journal du Havre alleges that the new King of Madagascar has manifested to Father Jean, a missionary and part-ular friend of his Majesty, his intention to become a Roman Catholic.

THE PRINCE OF ORLEANS.—"The Princes of Orleans," says the Pays, "who had entered the service of the United States in the struggle against the South, have suddenly come to the resolution to return to Europe. They are expected at Southampton by the next packet from New York."

THE QUEEN OF NAPLES AND THE ENGLISH PRESS.—The London correspondent of the Ami de la Religion announces an authority that The Daily News will be prosecuted by criminal information for its libel on the Queen of Naples, notwithstanding the apology lately made by that Journal.—London Review.

GARIBALDI.—The following is the text of a letter addressed by Garibaldi to the provincial Council of Calabria Ulterior, in answer to an address from that body:—"Capra, 12th Nov.—Your blood has not deviated from the path traced by your ancestors! When the destined hour shall strike, I shall again see you in arms, to the terror of the enemies of Italy. The time is not far distant. Be all prepared for that last trial, and we shall conquer.—Ever yours, G. GARIBALDI."

GOLD IN AUSTRALIA.—When the last mail left Australia, the Great Exhibition of Victoria had been opened at Melbourne. In order to give an idea of the quantity of gold which had been extracted from the colony, and which amounted at that time to upwards of twenty-six million ounces, or 1,402 cubic feet, a pyramid of light metal, with gilt facing, was about to be put in the exhibition. The base is 9 feet square, and 2 1/2 feet high, and from this will spring a pyramid 48 feet in height. The above-mentioned quantity of gold would form a solid pyramid of such dimensions.
