**General Intelligence.**

**DOMESTIC.**

**GOLD.**—We have several accounts of large yields of gold from quartz crushed at Tangier, Sherbrooke, and Bridgewater, varying from \$60 to \$156.50 per ton.

An express runs to Laidlaw's mines, bringing them within an hour of Halifax city.

**RAILWAY ACCIDENT.**—A collision occurred on Thursday last at Richmond, by which two cars were damaged and a woman slightly injured.

**THE ANNIVERSARY OF THE SETTLEMENT OF HALIFAX** appears now to be the 21st of June and not the 8th, as has been supposed for the last hundred years and more. This intelligence is obtained by the late Commissioner of Records, who has discovered by some ancient record that a letter written by Lord Cornwallis to the War office on the 22nd June in the year of the settlement of the city says: "I arrived here yesterday," &c. Arrangements for the observance of the anniversary are not yet completed. The *Chronicle* says: It has been resolved to have two addresses—one in the morning for the youth, and the principal one in the evening for the citizens generally, and that it is considered probable that Chief Justice Young, S. L. Shannon Esq., and Rev. Mr. Brewster will take a prominent part in the proceedings of the day.

**THE ESCAPED PRISONERS.**—Baker was captured by a Chester man and given into the custody of D. Dimock Esq. The County constable however on his way from Chester to Halifax, was induced to remove the prisoner's handcuffs when he effected his escape from the wagon into the woods, and has not yet been caught.—Burdell was captured between Chester and Windsor by Messrs. John Williams, Joshua Fader and Joseph Mills, and is now again safely lodged in his old quarters.

The *Chronicle* of Tuesday, gave the following as the mode of their escape from the Penitentiary:

On Sunday morning it was found that the padlocks on the doors of Burdell's and Baker's cells had been opened. After leaving the cells, the prisoners, it appears, ascended a winding stairs to the third story of cells, which portion of the inner building is unfinished. They then procured a loose plank, which they placed on the sill of the window of the outer building, and were thus enabled to walk across the space from the cells to the front window. After twisting one of the iron bars of the grating aside sufficient to allow them to pass out, one end of the cord which formed the lacing of Burdell's bed was fastened within, and they then lowered themselves to the ground."

**ROBBERS.**—Two scoundrels, named Reycraft and Smith, were caught in the act of robbing the store of Mr. J. Bennet, and the office of Mr. Peter Ross, on Bennet's wharf last Tuesday night. Reycraft is a noted robber, and we believe has but recently been released from the Penitentiary.

**NEW PACKET.**—Launched at Shelburne, on the 3rd inst., a fine schooner called the *Monitor*, 184 tons, intended for a Boston Packet, for which she appears well adapted, having excellent accommodations for about 50 passengers.

**Prince Edward Island.**

A P. E. Island paper of the 14th inst. reports a large number of vessels put at Georgetown, prevented proceeding to the westward by the ice. Some sixty sail of vessels for the Magdalen Islands, were at the same place waiting the clearing of the obstruction. Also a vessel from Halifax for Bedeque.

The Steamer *Westmorland* made her first trip for the season on Monday 5th inst., on which day she arrived here from Pictou. On the following morning she left this port for Summerside and Shediac, but owing to the ice in the Straits, she was unable to proceed farther than Crapaud, and returned here the same evening. She made a similar attempt on Wednesday and with a little success. On Thursday about noon, she started for Pictou and returned her last evening.—Charlottetown *Protestant* 10th.

**New Brunswick.**

The Circuit Court is now in session in this City—the Chief Justice presiding. He expresses his approbation to the Grand Jury, in his address to them, of the bill passed last winter, abolished the death-penalty for all crimes except murder.

**THE COTTON FACTORY.**—We noticed some time since, that William Parks, Esq., of this city, was erecting a cotton factory near the Railway Station. We are glad to learn that the establishment is completed, and some cloth has been manufactured, and sent to England for the Exhibition. The *News* informs us that eight or ten girls are employed at present, but, of course, as soon as the war ceases, and material can be obtained, a large business will likely be done.—*Intelligencer*.

**Canada.**

MR. PATTON has been defeated by Mr. Murrich in the Saugeen Division. It is rumored that Mr. Crawford, the member for East Toronto, will accept the office of Solicitor General. *Canada Baptist May 8th.*

**CANADA LAWYERS MUST SHAVE THEIR FACES.**—Chancellor Vankoughnet has signalized his ascension to the Chancery Bench of Canada, by issuing an edict requiring Barristers practicing in his Court to appear with shaved faces.

A quantity of rock oil, floating on a creek at Eniskillen, C. W., took fire by some means not accounted for, and burned with great intensity. It was at one time feared that the flames, which rose above a hundred feet, would reach the neighboring wells.
