

Latest from Europe!

NEW YORK, May 17.—The steamship Great Eastern, from Milford Haven 6th inst., arrived. The Paris Patrie says that the recent visit of the French Minister to Richmond was entirely political, and its purport was known to President Lincoln.

FRANCE.

Further reinforcement of troops and supplies of war Material are to be despatched to Mexico.

The Paris journals of Monday 28th ult., announce the recall of General Goyon, the Commander-in-Chief of the French army in the Roman States. The Patrie believes that the General has already arrived in Paris.

The rumour of an anticipated intervention in American affairs by France and England is again repeated, backed by further journalistic authorities and "guesses at truth." This time it is the Independence which asserts that the Western Powers have agreed to intervene; but, as the author of the rumour in this journal is only its Paris correspondent, he is merely repeating what everybody in the French capital professed to be assured of.

ITALY.

TURIN, May 1.—The Turin papers state that the conspiracy at Milan is exaggerated.

NAPLES, May 1.—The King continues to be enthusiastically received. His Majesty will proceed next week to Palermo.

ROME, May 1.—The whole Neapolitan royal family have gone to Porto Anzio. They have dined with the Pope. His Holiness will return to Rome on Saturday next.

The reception of Victor Emmanuel in Naples on the 28th ult. is a very fair answer to the reports which attributed reactionary sentiments to the people of the Southern capital. His Majesty arrived at Naples at four o'clock in the afternoon and the enthusiasm which his appearance called forth it is said to be "indescribable." In the evening the whole city was illuminated, and a serenade was held in front of the palace, at which 500 singers and instrumentalists assisted. The climax of the despatch received from Naples is contained in the sentence, "perfect order prevails." The King was escorted by three French frigates, whilst a similar number of vessels of war of our own country lay in the bay. It is stated that the fines decreed against the National Guards will be remitted, and an amnesty for the Neapolitan press declared, in honour of the King's visit.

SWITZERLAND.

BERNE, May 1.—According to the favorable declaration of the Japanese Government, the Federal Council has given orders that a Swiss embassy shall be despatched to Japan as early as possible.

AUSTRIA.

VIENNA, May 1.—A communication was made by the government to the Lower House of the Council of the Empire to-day, stating that a bill on Ministerial responsibility was to be discussed by the Chambers according to constitutional rule.

GREECE.

ATHENS, April 26.—The blockade of the Gulf of Argos has been raised by the government.

The soldiers who received amnesty have been re-drafted into the royal army. The corps d'armée employed in the siege of Nauplia has returned.

DISTURBANCES IN PORTUGAL.

LISBON, April 30, evening.—Disturbances have taken place near Oporto respecting the new taxes.

Three hundred men attacked the collector's house, and burned his papers. The disturbances were afterwards suppressed.

MISCELLANEOUS.

A German paper announces the formation, in Berlin, of a "Society for the Abolition of Christianity!"—Guardian.

THE BABY AT THE BAR.—A prisoner arraigned at the Middlesex Session recently, for theft from furnished lodgings, was a young mother, who stood at the bar, and in her arms a smiling infant, perhaps the first child, who bequeathed the time of the trial with its playful noise and antics. The case was clear, and the jury had no alternative but the verdict "Guilty," but they coupled it with a "recommendation to mercy." The Judge received the announcement, but could not see on what grounds the "recommendation" was based. Lodging-house-keepers must, he said, be protected from these depredations; and, with all due consideration for the opinion of the jury, he must pass sentence of six months' imprisonment, with hard labour. So the matter stood for the time. But presently the jury made a second appeal to the Judge for a mitigation. In the course of discussion, he very acutely said, "Ah, I see what it is, gentlemen; it's the baby!" The fact was undeniable, and at length even his Lordship yielded to what we dare say, was the feeling of the whole Court. The poor woman was recalled, and told that her sentence was reduced from six to four months' imprisonment. Again she appeared with the baby in her arms, and, curtseying her thanks, retired.

RESTORATION OF PEACE BETWEEN SPAIN AND MOROCCO.—The last remaining obstacle to the restoration of the status quo between Spain and Morocco has been removed by the payment of the last instalment of the war indemnity. The steam frigate Isabella II. conveyed the money to Alicante, and the month of May will not pass before the Spanish troops have evacuated Tetuan.

DEATH OF A DAUGHTER OF M. KOSSUTH.—A letter from Turin of the 22nd says:—"Kossuth has just lost his second daughter, Guglielmina, eighteen years old. He took her to Neri, near Genoa, on the borders of the Mediterranean, hoping that the mildness of the climate would arrest the progress of the chest malady to which she has succumbed. The genial climate and the tender care of which she was the object could only delay her death by a few months."

HOW A GREAT MAN'S AUTOGRAPH WAS GOT.—It is well known that towards the latter years of the late Duke of Wellington's life it was next to impossible to coax or wheedle his autograph out of him. A lady who had an album garnished with the autographs of most of the great men of the day, but who wanted that of the "Great Captain," mentioned her distress to the late Mr. H—, and, a few days after, he, to her surprise and pleasure, brought her a note. It ran thus:—"Field-Marshal the Duke of Wellington never ordered a pair of braces of the Messrs. Simpkin. If F. M. the Duke of Wellington had ordered the articles he could not forget it. The Duke of Wellington always pays for his braces." This was a very odd document for a lady's album, but its authenticity was undoubted. The way in which this singular note was elicited was this:—Mr. H— filled up one of the Bankruptcy Court forms, and signed it, informing the Duke that in winding up the affairs of Messrs. Simpkin he (the assignee) found on their books the sum of 6s. 6d. due by his Grace for a pair of braces. Mr. H—'s ruse was founded on pure fiction, but it succeeded; and now in a certain lady's album may be seen the curious note of which we have given a copy. Court Journal.
