COMPULSORY PREPAYMENT BY STAMP.

1. The system of compulsory prepayment havingbeen adopted by the Legislature in the last Session, the public are hereby notified that, commencing on Thursday the 1st of May, the postage of all letters posted in Nova Scotia, and addressed to places within this Province must be prepaid by stamp.

2. The postage on letters mailed at Halifax, to be

forwarded by packet to the United States, Newfoundland Bermuda, and the West Indies, will be ten cents the half ounce, prepaid by stamps. Letters for the above places, when posted at a country post office, will be the half ounce, which must also be prepaid by stamp. Those received from the United States by packet, ad dressed to places in this Province other than Halifax, will be charged as at present. When intended for delivery in Halifax, they will be charged ten cents the half ounce. Prepaid letters received from Newfound land, Bermuda, and the West Indies, will be charged with an additional postage of one and a balf cents; these received unpaid from the above named places will be taxed ten cents the half ounce.

3. Letters dropped into the letter box insufficiently paid or wholy unpaid, will, until the 1th of June next be forwarded, as at present, viz., with a charge of double postage; but after the above date such letters will be sent to the Dead Letter Office, Halitax, where they will be opened and returned to the writers.

4. Letters addressed to the United States by land mail, or to Canada in closed mail, via the United States, by packet, or by land, and to New Brunswick and Prince Edward's Island, will be forwarded as at

present,-Prepayment optional. 5. Official letters addressed to the Provincial and Military Departments, are to be treated as at present. 6. All books, pamphlets and other printed matter of a like description, mailed in the Province, for delivery in the Province, are liable to a charge of one cent per

ource, to be prepaid by stamp. 7. Periodicals (other than newspapers), whether British, Foreign or Colonial, when specially deveted to religious education, to general education, to argriculture, to temperance, or to any branch of science, and addressed directly from the office of publication shall be transmitted to any place in Nova Scotia to which they are addressed free or charge. Such periodicals, however, when reposted, to be liable to a charge of one cent per ounce, or fraction of an ounce, to be

prepaid by stamp. 8. Newspapers printed and published in any foreign country, and addressed to any place in Nova Scotia, are to be charged one cent each.

9. All Newspapers, whether Foreign, British er Colonial (except such as are published in this Province), when re-posted for transmisssion by man, are liable to a charge of one cent each, which must be prepaid by stamp; otherwise they will not be forwarded.
