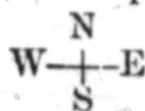

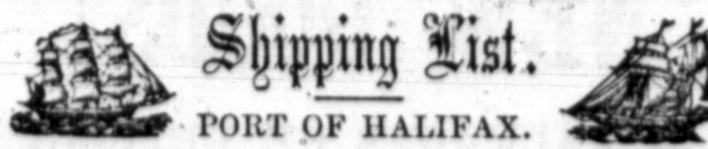

PORT OF NEW YORK.—The number of vessels entered at the port of New York from foreign ports during the month of August was 469 and the number cleared for foreign ports during the same period, 465.—During the same month last year there were 336 entries and 422 clearances.

A brig named the Alma, loaded with plaster, went ashore on the Isle O'Haute last Wednesday, in a fog, and became a total wreck. One man lost. It was blowing heavy at the time.

Wreck.—The schr. Pandora, Capt. John McLellan, from Cape Breton bound to Halifax, with a cargo of dry codfish and mackerel, struck on a ledge off Cape Canso on the 21st ult., and became a total wreck.—Some of the mackerel and the sails of the vessel were saved. No insurance on the vessel.
