ITALY.

TURIN, Oct. 17 .- The Minister-at-War, has ordered a court-mortial upon General Favergues and his aide-de-camp under the following curious circumstances. THE ROBBERY OF BANK-NOTE PAPER.-A clue has been obtained to the robbery of Bank of England-note paper from Messrs. and Jane McDonald. Portal's mills, at Laverstoke. Two men are charged with being concerned in the robbery. No evidence was given as to their share in the matter, but it was stated that on the previous day a man had been taken into custody at Birmingham while in the act of printing forged Bank of England notes from some of the stolen paper.
