RUSSIA.—An imperial decree repeals certain taxes in Poland hitherto paid by Jews only.

TURKEY.—A slight Albanian revolt had taken place in the district of Sentari. The leaders were arrested.

SPAIN.—Spanish Government demanded the punishment of the Americans who violated the Spanish flag. American Minister had an audience of the Queen, and assured her the American Government had not authorized the acts of the captain of the Montgomery.

The Bank of France advanced its rate of discount to four.

ITALY.

TURIN, Oct. 17.—The Minister-at-War has ordered a court-martial upon General Favergues and his aide-de-camp under the following curious circumstances. This general being in command of a camp at Bologna, was going into the town one evening very late, when the sentinel of the barrier guard, who had received orders to let no one out of the camp, stopped him.

General Favergues, instead of rewarding the man for his firmness in the discharge of his duty, got the corporal of the guard to bring him away from his post, and then being all the while dressed in plain clothes, went up to the soldier and asked furiously whether he did not know him?

RUSSIA.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 21.—The minister of Finance has issued a circular, stating that as the newly proposed law for the Reform of the trade tax is still under the consideration of the Council of the Empire, an imperial decree has decided that the tax will be levied at present only for the first six months of 1863.

CHINA.

From Shanghai we have intelligence to the effect of September, from which it appears that the rebels have attacked Shanghai, but were driven back with great loss.

THE ROBBERY OF BANK-NOTE PAPER.—A clue has been obtained to the robbery of Bank of England-note paper from Messrs. Portal's mills, at Laverstoke. Two men are charged with being concerned in the robbery.

THE VETERAN PREMIER.—Lord Palmerston completed his seventy-eighth year on Monday, 20th ult. The Daily News adds that some idea of the robust health which the Premier enjoys may be formed from the fact that on the previous Wednesday, while his lordship was in an open carriage in the procession (at the opening of the Hartley Institute) a shower of rain fell.

THE EMPEROR AND THE BOY.—The Times Paris correspondent thinks the following questionable story worthy of a place in his letter:—"Walking the other day on the beach at Biarritz, his Majesty happened to meet an intelligent-looking boy, about eight or nine years old, who took off his hat as he passed.
