News Summary.

The English Mail by the R. M. Steamer Asia reached us on Friday morning. It brings but little news in addition to previous accounts. The Polish Insurrection still continues, although the Russian authorities are Friday last, but it soon thawed. On Monday exercising the most rigorous and unrelenting means of repression. The amount of British population, who have emigrated to the Island within a very few years past, is probably between forty and fifty thousand.

The Confederates have been moving to their left up the Rappahannock, which still forms the main line of division between the hostile forces. Gen. Lee is said to have gone to Chatanooga, leaving the command with Ewell | tions. and A. P. Hill.

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Nothing further decisive has been heard of the seige of Charleston. It is said that the "Robert E. Lee," which left this port a few days since, is said to have been captured a tempting to run the blockade at Wilmingt r.

MINERAL WEALTH .- " It never rains but it pours." This musty old proverb may well be applied to this country as regards the mineral wealth, which the band of the explorer is almost taining about daily turning up to the rays of the sun. A few days ago we noticed the discovery of Anticony in the Township of Ham, of Gold and Silver quartz at Tyendinage, in the county of Hastings, and of further deposits of Copper in the rich belt of country which extends no thward from Lake Memphremageg to Point Levi. We now hear fortable of lead deposits, said to be of unusual richness in the same county of Hastings. In the short space of half an hour forty pounds of pure soft lead were taken from a hole about two feet deep and three feet in circumference.
