





) TALIONS are reminded of the general orders already issued concerning Officers providing themselves with Unifo m.

The Commander-in-Chief has reason to know that many officers have as yet taken no steps to furnish themselves with the required equipment. Commanding Officers are to understand that they are held primarily responsible that the necessary regulations on this head are complied with by the officers under their respective commands.

As the Militia Officers will have to perform duty this year, the Commander-in-Chief wishes to give due notice on this point by this, which will be the last order one the subject, so that no officer after being approved and commissioned can excuse himself for not being uniformed and equipped on the ground of his not having been apprised.

Officers not in regimentals will not only be unrecognised on parade duties, but their default in not providing themselves with uniform and appointments, if not accounted for to the satisfaction of the Commander-in-Chief, will be seriously noticed. By order,
