GREECE

"Long live Alfred King of the Greeks!" is the popular cry at Athens. The unanimity of the Greeks in calling for the English Prince seems to be perfect, even the most republican of the provinces having joined heartily in choice of the Athenians. At one place on the Turkish frontier the people, the army, and the public authorities, acting with one accord, have gone the length of proclaiming his Royal Highness King of Greece, without waiting for any formal election. The decision, of the Hellenists themselves is plain enough, but the question, seen from a diplomatic point of view, is full of doubts and difficulties. The *Journal de St. Petersburg* clears up one very important point, however. Russia demands the exclusion of Prince Alfred. According to the official journal, the Russian Government has never for a moment thought of deviating from the principles of the Protocol of London, by which the members of the reigning families of all the protecting powers are excluded from the throne of Greece. The French journals continue to watch the progress of events with very unfriendly eyes. The *Journal des Debats* even goes so far as to speak of the "English pretender," and assert that England has already taken the helm at Athens by controlling the action of the Provisional Government. The *Constitutionnel*, which seems to speak the mind of the French Government on this question, continues to say that while France might not interfere in the elevation of Prince Alfred to the throne, it would be ready to join issue with England in defence of those interests in the East which that elevation would certainly menace.

The Turkish Government is reported to have intimated to the Provisional Government of Greece that it will prevent the election of deputies to the National Assembly by the Greeks resident within its jurisdiction. This news is said to have caused a great sensation at Athens.

MARSEILLES.—It is asserted that a despatch has been received by the English Consul from Greece, stating that 12,800 votes are known to have been recorded in favour of Prince Alfred.

GARIBALDI TO THE HUNGARIANS.

The following communication has been addressed by Garibaldi to the Hungarians:—

"Pisa, Dec. 2.

"HUNGARIANS,—Look upon Italy as a sister, and the Italians are ready to fight by your side for the deliverance of your people, as you fought for the deliverance of ours. How noble they were, those valorous sons of Hungary, upon our Southern field of battle! On looking at them I more than once exclaimed to myself, 'O, those gallant fellows will soon get rid of their tyrants, and in their struggle against the despots we will return the blood which they are shedding for us.' Do not trouble yourselves about the injustice of Ministers and the ingratitude of persons holding high places. The people love you, and the cause of Hungary is now the cause of the Italians. Give your hand to the oppressed people who surround you, and hope that God will no longer allow the martyrdom of his creatures.

MISCELLANEOUS.

It is stated in letters from Copenhagen that the second daughter of Prince Christian of Denmark, and sister of the future Princess of Wales, will be affianced to the Hereditary Grand Duke Nicholas of Russia. The Princess will enter the Greek Church before the marriage. A close relationship between the royal families of England and Russia will be established by this union.

THE MARRIAGE OF THE PRINCE OF WALES.—It has been arranged that the marriage of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales to the Princess Alexandra of Denmark shall be solemnized at St. George's Chapel, Windsor, and not according to precedent at the Chapel Royal, St. James's. The Lord Chamberlain has received Her Majesty's commands that the ceremony shall be celebrated with the utmost magnificence. The Household of the future Princess of Wales will comprise the Marchioness of Carnarvon, the Countess of Macclesfield, the Countess of Morton, and the Countess DeGrey, as Ladies in waiting. Lord Harris will be at the head of the Household of the Princess.

THE PROSPECT OF SUPPLIES OF COTTON.—A short time ago the stock of cotton in Liverpool had fallen below 70,000 bales, and prices were very wild in consequence. Exports were checked, and purchases for home consumption almost ceased. Cargoes began also to arrive from India and elsewhere. The stock gradually augmented under the combined operation of these influences till it reached, at the end of October, 350,000. It is now pretty certain that, calculating on what has yet to arrive, and making liberal allowance for probable purchase and export, the stock at the end of the year will reach nearly, if not quite 400,000 bales. The supply which we shall obtain from India is still no doubt to a considerable extent obscure, but the best informed merchants count on decidedly more than last year, and in our expectations from Brazil and Egypt we cannot be very far wrong. The demand for export next year will, it is anticipated, be large. The continent will have to draw almost its entire supply from this country, instead of a portion only, as in ordinary years, when much American cotton goes direct to Havre, and not a little Egyptian cotton direct to Trieste.—*Economist*.
