

PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS.—The Montreal Herald learns that construction of the Parliament Buildings at Ottawa is to be prosecuted with vigor; and that the buildings are to be occupied next session.

VESSELS BUILDING.—There are forty-three vessels now in course of construction at the city of Quebec, and the total tonnage is 50,480 tons. All these are building under the direction of Lloyd's surveyor, and all are first class ships.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE IN MONTREAL.—On Saturday morning, between the hours of two and three o'clock, a fire broke out in the large building corner of Great St. James and St. Francois Xavier Streets, comprising the Medical Hall, the offices of the Montreal Insurance Co., Mr. Springle's architect office, and the rooms of the Young Men's Christian Association. The fire, it seems, originated from a stove in Mr. Springle's office, which was almost adjoining a wooden partition. A boy named John Harwood, between 12 and 13 years of age, who was asleep in one of the upper rooms of the building, was exposed so long to the smoke that he was suffocated. When found life was almost extinct, and he died within a few hours afterwards. Hon. Joshua R. Giddings, the American Consul in this city, who occupied a room in the same portion of the building, was asleep at the time, and was quickly awakened, but before he could make his escape fell prostrate and became insensible from the effects of the smoke, and was conveyed for safety to another part of the hotel, when he soon recovered. We have not learned the extent of the losses, but they must necessarily be very heavy.—Advertiser.

Latest from the States!

[From Telegrams to Morning and Evening papers]

FEB. 24.—In the California and Nevada boundary dispute in Honey Lake Valley a California Sheriff attempted to serve a civil process. Residents fired upon Sheriff and posse, wounding six. Washington's birth day was celebrated quite generally in all the principal cities.—Snow drifted two or three feet deep in Virginia on Sunday.

FEB. 25.—Resolutions of Delaware Legislature, asking Missouri to send delegates to national convention, to effect armistice, severely denounced by Governor Gamble, and Missouri Legislature, informally passed over. The Richmond Examiner contains a despatch from Fort Hudson, dated 18th inst., reporting the capture of the Federal ram steamer Queen of the West, in the Red River, striking her colors after a severe engagement with the batteries at that place. The "Calcutta Englishman," (newspaper) reports that a Confederate privateer is cruising in the Bay of Bengal, determined to burn every Federal vessel in those waters.

FEB. 26.—The barque Sallie Bousell which was reported to have been sunk by the Confederate cruiser Florida, has arrived safely at Key West. Dupont's powder mill at Wilmington, Delaware, exploded, killing fourteen persons.—A despatch arrived at New York, per steamer Glasgow, states that the new Confederate steamer 296 now lying in the Mersey, expects to sail in a few days for the Confederate rendezvous.

FEB. 27.—The enlargement of the Canal at Vicksburg continues steadily to progress, three thousand men being engaged in the work.—Port Royal advices to the 20th inst. state that there has been movement of troops, and that the health of the Federal army in that quarter is good.

FEB. 28.—The expedition from Corinth has captured 200 Confederates at Tusculum, and a large amount of stores, etc.—The British steamer Solent left Aspinwall on the 7th inst. with \$5,000,000 treasure.—The Ariel has arrived at New York from Aspinwall with less than \$300,000.—Secretary Chase's recent decision that foreign vessels may participate in trade between California and the coast via Isthmus, excited considerable interest.

MARCH 2.—The N. Y. Herald's Washington despatch says Gen. Grant gives encouragement of favorable results at Vicksburg, not only the capture of Vicksburg but also the capture of Confederate army expected. Also that certain parties are preparing charges against General McClellan, with a view to a court-martial. Reported President Lincoln will immediately call out 600,000 men under Conscription Act. British Steamer Columbia from Charleston arrived at Bermuda, with cargo of cotton, would take return cargo of arms.

Confederates at Savannah reported launched a massive iron-clad. People there constantly dread advance of negro regiments in interior. Officers of British frigate "Petrel" report Confederates have network of torpedoes across Charleston Harbor Channel.

But little business was done. Hon. Provincial Secretary laid on the table a number of despatches and papers concerning light houses, telegraph company, trade with Canada, and Indian reserves. Mr. Wade presented a petition from parishioners of St. George's against the incorporation of the Episcopal Church Synod. Hon. Mr. Howe laid on the table a number of documents concerning gold lands at Lunenburg. He explained the action of the government and the award of the arbitrators and wished the House to decide upon the subject. Dr. Tupper thought the government, having appointed arbitrators, ought to deal with the matter, and not to shift the responsibility on the Legislature. The debate was adjourned.
