THE Law Officers of the Crown have delivered the following decision:— (A TRUE COPY.)

HALIFAX, Dec. 9, 1863. Having considered the accompanying documents and the point therein raised, we are of opinion that under Section 118 of the act regulating Militia Training, which provides for the collection of fines for non attendance at Militia Training, the suit, if the fine be less than Twelve Dollars, should be brought before one Justice, and above that sum, before two Justices for the County of Halifax, and not in the Mayor's Court. We are also of opinion that all things being regularly done, the Justices cannot interfere with the functions or decision of the Board of Officers, but are merely the means under the Act of enforcing the judgment of the Board of Officers on the appeal.
