THE Commander-in-Chief of the Nova Scotia Militia observes, that by collating returns of effectives and expenditure of Ball Cartridge, in many instances more than the regular allowance of sixty rounds per man has been expended by the Volunteers.

A first issue will be made this year of forty rounds per effective, according to last returns; but no issue will be made to any corps which has expended an excess until the latter is replaced by their own requisition and payment.

Absentees and unavoidable fractions of kegs will invariably leave an annual surplus, which should be faithfully carried on to the next year; otherwise the over expenditure of ammunition will have to be constantly rectified from Head Quarters. The officers commanding both Militia Regiments and Volunteer corps are requested to be pa ticular that those under their orders conform to the Regulations laid down on this important point, as by not doing so very much trouble and correspondence will be the inevitable re-
