W. Ackhurst, 124. T. Bauer, 19. Ward Four.—JOHN MURPHY, 130. P. Thompson, 44. Ward Five.—W. ROCHE, 289. E. Leahy, 288. Ward Six.—J. MUMFORD, 122. E. Meynell, 65.

Alderman Leahy demanded a scrutiny of the votes polled in Ward 5, but not in time to prevent the return of Alderman Roche. The new Mayor and Aldermen were sworn into office on Saturday afternoon. Things went on very quietly. A large number of electors on both sides got a cheap ride to the polls. The city cabs were in great demand. In the evening a number of boys paraded the city with torches fifes and drums, probably at the successful candidates' expense.

ANOTHER VICTIM.—A man named Thomas Tracey was found dead on Thursday afternoon, on the steps of a rum shop called The Lancers. An inquest was held, and the following verdict returned: "Died from the effects of excessive intoxication." Who were the guilty parties? FIRE DEPARTMENT.—The City authorities have decided to erect a bell tower and place a fire alarm bell at Freshwater. A fire-hose and reel are also to be kept there. An engine is to be placed in the northern part of the city on part of the estate of the late Hon. Hugh Bell.

THE HORTICULTURAL SHOW at the Society's Gardens is to be held on the 31st Inst. WINDSOR.—A large number of people assembled here on Wednesday last to witness the horse-racing. As usual there was much gambling and drinking in connection with the affair. LECTURE.—Rev. Dr. Forrester is to lecture before the Provincial Teachers' Association at Windsor, to-morrow evening. The Association is holding its second Anniversary here this and following days to commence this morning at 10 o'clock.

The up-train to Windsor, on Tuesday 29th ult., was thrown off the track near Windsor, by coming into collision with a gravel train. But little damage was done. KENTVILLE.—The Provincial Agricultural Exhibition commences this day at Kentville. There will doubtless be a large gathering of people from the surrounding districts and more distant parts.

A colored man, named Norton, has been committed to Bridgetown jail, charged with poisoning his wife. Mr. J. J. Crawford, of Annapolis, met with an accident on board a schooner on his way to St. John, and unfortunately broke his leg. PRESENTATION.—On Thursday the 24th September, the members of the congregation of James' Church at New Glasgow, presented their worthy Pastor, Rev. David Roy, with a very elegant and substantial Carriage, and a set of silver mounted Harness, costing in all one hundred and thirty-six dollars, in token of respect for his character, and their appreciation of his ministerial services.—E. Newfoundland.

The Fishery at Twillingate in the early part of the season was very poor in consequence of which numbers proceeded to the Labrador, where they have done well. At Trinity Bay, the Fishery has been very bad, but at Bay de Verds just the reverse. In this locality during the whole summer the fish has been most abundant, the flakes there are literally loaded with Fish; it is said to be the best fishery ever known. Accounts from the Labrador Fishery are encouraging.—Public Ledger, 16th ult.

Prince Edward Island.

The Normal School is now closed, Mr. J. H. Webster, Head Master of the Institution having been appointed Teacher of the Grammar School of the Prince of Wales College, and the pupils of the Normal School transferred to the new department. What disposition of the Normal School building will be made we do not know, but we understand that some of the teachers of Free Schools in town are applying for permission to occupy the vacant building.—Ross' Weekly.

New Brunswick.

The sudden rise of water in the Kennebecas has swept away hundreds of tons of hay from the low lands on the banks and islands of the river, causing a great destruction of property, and much injury to many poor and industrious farmers.—Globe.

THE WOOD TRADE.—There have been sent to Liverpool from St. John so far this year, 58,207,000 feet of deals, against 62,558,000 feet in the same period of last year, and 67,818,000 feet in the same period of 1861. There were in port, yesterday, 22 ships of 16,629 tons against 18 of 12,144 tons here at same date in 1862—of which 10 are loading for Liverpool, against 4 in 1862.—Globe.

The Borderer informs us that a very large bear, who has been helping himself to the fat mutton up on the mountains, was trapped a few days ago by Mr. W. B. Baner. Large quantities of hay which were lying in swath during the late heavy rains, in the neighborhood of Sackville, were much damaged.

Canada.

THE CANADIAN AGRICULTURAL ASSOCIATION recently held its eighteenth show at Kingston C. W. Although the weather was unfavorable and the articles on exhibition fewer than on some former occasions yet it was deemed a success. The next annual exhibition in the fall of 1864 is to be at Hamilton.

ABSCONDED.—A Mr. Charles M. Symon the freight agent of the G. T. Railway Co., at Point Levi, has left for parts unknown with \$5000 or \$6000 belonging to the company.

STRUCK OIL.—A company have been, for some time past boring for oil at Gaspé Basin. At a depth of 560 feet oil of a pale greenish brown color has made its appearance.

PARLIAMENTARY BUILDINGS.—The sum of \$100,000 has been voted for the government buildings at Ottawa.
