MISCELLANEOUS.

DEATH OF SIR CULLING EARDLEY EARDLEY.—It is with deep regret that we announce the death of this amiable and excellent man, after a painful illness of several weeks' continuance. Owing to the prevalence of the small-pox, and a case which occurred in his own establishment, he, setting an example to the persons of his household, was re-vaccinated. From some derangement of blood, or other constitutional cause, it had not the desired effect. For the last three weeks the late baronet has suffered severely, and at twenty minutes past three o'clock on Thursday morning he fell asleep in Jesus, at his residence at Bedford Park, Hertford. The deceased baronet was the son of the late Sir Culling Smith, and was born in 1805. He was educated at Oriel College, Oxford, and obtained a place in the second class in classical honours in 1827, but, on account of religious scruples with regard to the oaths administered in taking a B. A. degree, did not graduate. Sir Culling Eardley was much and deservedly respected and took an active share in the proceedings of the Evangelical Alliance and many other religious associations.

THE SPANISH PRISONERS.—We are thankful to be able to announce that the sentence on Matamoros and his companions in Spain, has been commuted by the Queen to a sentence of banishment. The terms of imprisonment for which they had been sentenced respectively, were seven and nine years; and for these periods they are now, by the "mercy" of Queen Isabella, ordered to be banished from "Her Sacred Majesty's" dominions. We are told that this commutation had taken place before the deputation which has visited Madrid had an opportunity of being heard. There can be no doubt, however, that their presence in Madrid has done something to hasten the decision of the Spanish Government, and perhaps, if they had been heard, they could not have succeeded in obtaining any further exercise of mercy from a woman so devoted to the Pope and the priesthood. Even the Pope and the priesthood might however have acted more wisely if they had dissuaded her Majesty from this exhibition of the character of their system. They have proved, once again, how little the Papacy has been altered by "the process of the suns." Probably, our banished brethren will now visit England. They will have such a reception here as will be heard of through Europe, and as may even convince the Queen of Spain herself how shocked and horrible Englishmen of all classes are, at barbarity which would be unwomanly if it were not Papish.—Freeman.
