

hands of the Federals, by the evacuation of Jackson, is incalculable and irreparable, and that nothing goes well in the South West. It also mentions the destruction of a railroad bridge over the Meuse river by a Federal cavalry raid from Newbern, cutting off communication for several weeks.

The steamer Imperial, from St. Louis, arrived at New Orleans on the 18th, without annoyance or obstruction.—A despatch has been received at Newbern on Monday the 20th, stating that the Federals had obtained total possession of Morris Island.

JULY 27th.—General Morgan and the balance of his command (Confederates) were captured yesterday.

Confederates attempted to drive Federals from Low's Island, on the 19th repulsed with great slaughter.

Bombardment of Fort Wagner, resumed 22nd. Federal charge was repulsed with severe loss.—The whole of the Federal loss since the 10th has been 1,000.

Federal cavalries captured 1200 head of cattle at Chester Gap.

On Thursday, all the Gaps were in possession of Federal forces.

The Washington Republican says that Gen. Lee has been delaying on the Upper Potomac to secure his plunder, and is now moving towards Richmond with immense trains of supplies.

Evening.—Council of Notabilities at Mexico proclaim Mexico an Empire, and Maximilian of Austria Emperor. Should he decline, they implore Napoleon to select one.

Immense conflagration at Havana on 22nd—destroying four millions dollars worth of sugar.

Assault on Fort Wagner on Thursday was desperate. Federals gaining foothold, but were forced to retire.

Jeff Davis's library captured at Jackson with papers showing full history of secession.

Reported leading citizens of Mississippi, disavowing of Confederacy, desire States return to Union.

Flour advanced 15 cents.

ARE ALL MEN BORN FREE AND EQUAL?—The Washington government have decided that—"Any one who is equivalent for a person drafted may be received as a substitute, but a colored man, under existing laws, is not a military equivalent."

The term of service of about 30,000 of the army of the Potomac expired on the 23rd, and they will in all probability return to their friends in the North. This will considerably reduce Gen. Meade's army.

YELLOW FEVER AT NEW YORK.—Several vessels have recently arrived at New York from Havana which have had on board cases of the yellow fever in its most malignant form.

The woods in New Jersey are filled with fugitive negroes from New York.

European News.

PRUSSIA.

A despatch from Berlin says that the Crown Prince of Prussia has written a defence to his Dantzic speech, which is considered as a direct attack on the Ministry. Though little is heard of the state of political feeling throughout Prussia, a letter from the capital assures us that the excitement is as great as ever, and the determination to uphold the Deputies against the Cabinet not a whit abated. Corporations and public bodies speak out freely, and two or three political associations have been formed for the purpose of testing the constitutional question in a court of law. Riots of a serious character, and said to be of a political nature, have occurred in Berlin. The rioters were dispersed by an armed force, after they had commenced to build barricades.

GREECE.

Events at Athens do not promise favourably for the comfort of the young King of the Greeks. A mutiny has taken place among the troops in the garrison, which, though eventually quelled, cost the lives of a good many persons, and led to the temporary occupation of the Bank, by a mixed force of English, French, and Russian marines.

The following is the official text of a letter addressed, on the 11th ult., by King George I., to the National Assembly of Greece:—

"Gentlemen,—Obedient to the dictates of my heart, I wished to accompany by the personal testimony of my sentiments the message by which the King of Denmark accepts for me the crown which the Hellenic nation calls me to wear. I shall proceed to my new country with transport, in order to prove to you from the present moment I know no other duty than to live and die as a good Greek, for the happiness and independence of the nation; and I am convinced, gentlemen, that, with your aid, by the assistance of God, the interests of the country, henceforth my own, will prosper to its advantage.

"I am happy and proud, gentlemen, to be able to salute you by the voice of those good and noble patriots, who, named by your confidence, have come here, far from their country, to salute me as your King. They will tell you that they have found me full of sympathy for my new country; and that I ardently desire to be able soon to find myself in the midst of you. Accept me, gentlemen, with the same confidence that actuates my heart for you, and teach me to labour with you for the happiness of my fine country, which may God protect.
