

We have not sought out for our readers the tales of horror in the accounts of the present war we might have done, but have in general given the bare simple facts as near as we could learn than from week to week.

How WE ARE REVENGING SUMPTER.—The following are the reported casualties of this war from the beginning of January 1, 1863:—

They have killed twenty-two thousand eight hundred and seventy-four more of our men than we have of theirs.

They have wounded, not mortally, thirty-nine thousand four hundred and fourteen more of our men than we have of theirs.

One hundred and fifty thousand more of our men have died of disease and of wounds than of theirs.

They have made prisoners of forty-six thousand more of our men than we have of theirs.

Our total casualties are two hundred and ninety-seven more than theirs—that is, our casualties have been fourteen thousand more than as much again as theirs.

This is the way we have "revenged the firing on Fort Sumpter."

But this is not all. We have spent almost two thousand millions more of money than they have spent.

We have made two hundred thousand of our women widows.

We have made one million of children fatherless.

Latest from Europe!

R. M. Steamer Asia arrived yesterday afternoon with news to the 9th inst.

The riots in the United States occupy a large portion of the English papers, both letter press and illustrations.

France seems desirous of throwing on England the responsibility of war or peace in the Polish question.

Her Majesty was to embark at Woolwich, for Germany, on the 11th.

Several Railway accidents had taken place recently. One of the most serious occurred a few miles from the Norfolk seat of the Prince of Wales.

DISSENTION IN THE FRENCH CABINET.—There is some talk current in Paris, and rather generally believed, to the effect that a party in the French Cabinet, headed by M. Fould, is endeavouring to bring about a displacement of M. Drouin de Lhuys.

La France says it is confirmed that England has renounced the despatch of an identical note to Russia.

PROPOSED ALLIANCE BETWEEN DENMARK AND SWEDEN.—An alliance between the Scandinavian monarchies—that of Denmark and that of Sweden—is considered certain and close at hand.

ASSASSINATION OF A MINISTER.—REACTION AGAINST FOREIGNERS.—The Marseilles Semaphore publishes the following despatch:—"Réunion, July 7.—News has been received here from Madagascar that the reaction against foreigners continued. The minister who signed the treaty with France had been assassinated."

MADAGASCAR.—The French were prohibited from taking possession of the land conceded to them by the treaty. M. Laborde, the French consul, had taken down his flag and withdrawn with his compatriots to a distance of eight leagues from the capital.

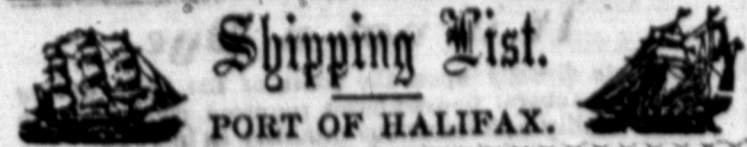
