New Brunswick.

DEATH OF A CENTENARIAN.—Thomas McFadden, a native of the Country of Fermanagh, Ireland, died in St. John on the 12th, at the advanced age of 100 years and 2 months.

Canada.

The Provincial Government are advertising for ten thousand pairs of pantaloons for the militia. They are to be made from cloth of Canadian manufacture, and delivered on or before the 20th April next.

Dr. T. Fraser, Staff Surgeon of the Royal Canadian Rifles, committed suicide, by cutting his throat with a razor on the 1st of January. Temporary insanity is assigned as the cause of the act.

Quebec Street Railway.—A company is about being formed for the purpose of building a horse railway in Quebec.

Earthquake in Lower Canada.—A correspondent at St. Andrew's, Canada East, informs the Toronto Globe, that a very severe shock of an earthquake was felt there on the night of the 1st inst., at 12 o'clock.

The Episcopal Bishop of Quebec, Right Rev. S. J. Mountain, died on the 6th inst., after a brief illness. He had been more than 50 years in the ministry.

It is stated that Messrs. Torrence, of Montreal, have shipped two tons weight of silver to China, to purchase tea.

The editor of the Presbyterian Standard acknowledges the receipt of one thousand dollars, to be equally divided between the Home and Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian Church.
