ANOTHER ROYAL MARRIAGE.—The London correspondent of The Times writes:— "It is whispered that the visit of Queen Victoria to Germany has more significance than a mere desire to enjoy the society of the Crown Princess of Prussia, and the immediate members of the late Prince Consort's family. The marriage of the Princess of Wales with the Princess Alexandra (whose accouchement, by the way, is expected in the middle of December) has opened fresh matrimonial projects, and there is reason to believe that the next Royal marriage of which the public will be informed will be that of the Prince Helena Augusta Victoria, the third daughter of her Majesty, with Prince George of Denmark, the youthful King of Greece. The Princess was born on the 25th of May, 1844, and is consequently in the eighteenth year of her age. The King of Greece is not quite so old, but the discrepancy in the ages of the youthful pair is too insignificant to be regarded as an impediment to a union which may otherwise appear desirable. The probability, therefore, is that the Royal Speech with which the session of 1864 will be opened will contain reference to this interesting subject, and will suggest the desirability of Parliament making some provision for the bride's dower and subsequent establishment.

THE OLDEST MARRIED COUPLE IN THE WORLD.—There residing in Marulan, in this colony, says The Sydney Empire, two persons, husband and wife, aged respectively 111 and 107 years. They are extremely feeble and bedridden, but are in possession of both sight and hearing. They were able to move about until lately, and formerly were extremely active in their habits. The old lady attempts to speak when she is addressed, but cannot make herself understood by strangers. Her utterance is so thick and inarticulate as to be little more than a few unmeaning sounds. The old man, however, although the eldest by four years, and usually lying in an apparently unconscious state, rouses himself occasionally, and then can speak so as to be easily understood. The old man arrived in the first fleet in 1788, and has consequently been seventy-five years in the colony of New South Wales.

A LION AT LARGE.—Some of the Madrid journals publish the following strange account:—"The town of Pampeluna was a few days back the scene of a fearful incident. A lion belonging to a travelling menagerie escaped from its cage and rushed through the streets, attacking everyone that it met. Three persons were killed by the terrible animal, and about a dozen received injuries. The number of victims would have been more considerable if the lion had not perceived a butcher's shop, into which he sprang, enticed by the meat displayed at the door. The butcher had the presence of mind to close his shop, and the owner of the lion being informed of the detention of the animal, fetched one of his cages and applied the opening of it to the shop door. The lion being satisfied rushed out as soon as the door was opened, and was caught in the cage as in a trap."

M. NADAR'S AERIAL MACHINE.—M. Nadar's newly-invented aerial machine, which is occupying considerable attention in Paris, is already nearly half-finished. Its dimensions are so enormous that it will have accommodation, it is declared, for more than a hundred passengers. The first aerial journey is to be to Balen. M. Nadar will call his balloon the "Quand-Memo."

Her Majesty the Queen, accompanied by those members of the Royal family who have travelled with her to Germany, and the court, were expected, on their return from the continent, to arrive at Windsor Castle on Thursday, the 10th and proceed to her visit to Balmoral, on or about the 14th of September.

AT a meeting of the PROVINCIAL AGRICULTURAL COMMITTEE, held at Kentville, on Tuesday, 15th inst., the following additional regulations were agreed upon: First—That five cents per mile for harned cattle, and three cents for horse, except draft, saddle, or carriage horses, be paid on all stock driven from Annapolis and Lunenburg, such sum not to exceed one hundred dollars. Second—All working oxen to be exhibited in the yoke. Third—Oxen not having been regularly used during the season shall not be considered working oxen. Fourth—Hay will be provided for stock, and potatoes for swine, during the exhibition. Fifth—All cattle and horses forwarded to the Exhibition must be provided with sufficient suitable material for fastening. Sixth—All articles belonging to any agricultural society, or other company, must be entered by the President or Secretary of such society or company. The law requires that all stock offered for exhibition remain upon the ground during the two days. By order of the Committee. WM. EATON, Secretary.
