war found very little difficulty in destroying the town of Kagosima, but they did not silence all the forts, and were in fact obliged to sheer off very considerably damaged. The forts seem to have been armed with the most tormidable kinds ot ordnance-10 inch guns and 13-inch mortars -probably of American manufacture, and were served with a skill and bravery evidently not expected by the attacking force. The fire these tremetrious pieces of artillery — much more powerful than on board the fleet—is said to have excerded in fierceness anything which officers of Crimean experience remember to have seen at Sebasropol, and some of them believe that it is only through spe ially fortunate circumstances that the whole fleet was not destroyed. Admiral Kaper has evidently very much underrated the defensive power of the Japanese; and a war with Japan is not likely to be the short and sharp affair which puny people expected. It seems likely to be the story of China over again, with the difference that the Japanese are vastly more formidable enemies than the Chinese were.
