

Mr. F. Stevens has supplied a great public want by fitting up commodious bathing houses on his property at the south end, which will be open on the first of July.

SQUIRRELS.—Mr. J. R. Willis has presented a pair of beautiful grey squirrels to the Horticultural Gardens, which will be an additional attraction to visitors. They are to be kept constantly caged to prevent the destruction of fruit and of birds nests to which they are prone.

The colony of grey squirrels, presented to the Province by Mr. Thos. Leahy, has been established at the Province Building.

ROYAL ACADIAN SCHOOL.—The annual meeting of subscribers to this most useful institution was held in the School Room on Friday last. The Vice President, John Naylor, Esq., occupied the chair. The usual annual reports were read by James B. Oxley, Esq. During the meeting on Friday, the following gentlemen were elected office-bearers for the ensuing year: Charles Twining, Esq., President; John Naylor, Esq., Vice President; Robert Noble, (Chairman.) John Muzler, Jas. B. Oxley, Tremain Twining, Joseph Bell, Esqrs. Executive Committee; James Thomson, Esq., Treasurer; Dr. J. Denham Hume, Secretary.

The Citizen says that a young man named Edward Horley was killed at Waverley on Saturday last, by the falling of a chimney which he was employed in taking down. An inquest was held before Coroner Weeks, when a verdict of accidental death was returned.

The Rev. G. M. Grant, Pastor of St. Matthew's Church in this city, started on a brief holiday tour yesterday through the Northern States and Canada. He had richly earned a brief respite from his multifarious duties, and we trust his tour may be a pleasant one.

COUNTY OF HALIFAX.—The Court of Quarter Sessions met on the 14th inst. The Justices of the Peace for the County, were specially summoned to attend the Sessions and Grand Jury the necessary local information to divide the County into Revisal Sections, and to nominate and select Revisors, to carry out the requirements of the Act to regulate the election of members to serve in the General Assembly.

There were 43 Justices in attendance, and much interest was manifested in the general business of the day, the Court continuing to sit uninterruptedly from 11 A. M. until nearly six o'clock. The Sessions divided the 29 Electoral districts of the County into 11 Revisal Sections.

Mr. Justice Nash's notice of motion relative to the granting of Licenses was considered.

Resolved,—That the Grand Jury be requested by the Sessions, hereafter to recommend no license for selling spirituous liquors, unless the party applying for license be recommended by a majority of the rate payers in the polling district in which he resides, as a fit and proper person to hold such license.

A warm and lengthy discussion ensued.—Two amendments, one requiring the recommendation for ten freeholders of the district; and the other by 25 of the rate payers were proposed, but on division were both lost. The original Resolution passed, 26 voting for, and 8 against.

MORE GOLD.—We learn from the Sun that gold discoveries have been made at Mount Rasch, Grand Lake, about two miles from Enfield station. A number of persons are now prospecting there.

The persons drowned by the upsetting of a boat near Clementsport, N. S., a few days ago, were John Fraser, Esq., and Mr. D. Dimars, neither wives, as before announced. It appears the boat went out fishing, and shortly afterwards the boat was discovered bottom up. The bodies were soon recovered. It is thought the boat was up by a squall of wind. Mr. Fraser resided in John. Mrs. W. H. Ray was not drowned.

The secretary of the Atlantic Telegraph Company makes the following statement of progress in the work of the new cable.—Up to this time hundred miles of the internal portion or "core" of the cable have been manufactured at the Gutta Percha Works, and this part of the cable is going on at the rate of fifty miles a week. The deliveries of iron wire and hemp, for the external coating, commenced the first week in June, and the spinning of the materials and the "core" so as to complete the cable, will commence at the end of June. The steamship Great Eastern is ordered round to the wharves from Liverpool, and will be moored either Southend or Sheerness. When she arrives the building of the iron tanks in her inside the storing of the cable in water, will at once commence.—*Id.*

New Brunswick.

Increase of the Revenue of the port of St. John, N. B., for the quarter ending 30th April 1864, \$23,423.

The Rev. Dr. Grey, of St. John, is to deliver the commemorative oration, at King's College, Windsor on the 30th inst.

We learn that a movement is in progress to organize joint stock company for the purpose of establishing an extensive Boot and Shoe manufactory in this city. It is proposed to secure capital of \$50,000 in shares of a reasonable amount each.—*Chron.*

The St. John Globe reports that Mr. Fleming is proceeding rapidly with the survey of the Intercolonial Railway. It is said he has two strong parties between the Riviere du Loup and the Tobique Mountains on the Central route, another party in the Mutapedia Valley on the North Shore; and he has a party organized to commence operations immediately between Truro and the New Brunswick line. His surveys of the Southern, Central, and North Shore routes, he intends shall be thorough in every respect, so that the fullest justice may be done to the merits of each of these routes. It is his intention to take in view the agricultural character of the soil, whilst regarding the paying capabilities of each route.—*Id.*

UNIVERSITY HONOURS.—The gold medal given by the Associated Alumni to the New Brunswick University, has been awarded to William Harrison Tilley, son of the Hon. Provincial Secretary of the sister Province, for the best Latin translation of the 15th letter of Junius.

RAILWAY EXTENSION WEST.—The St. John Telegraph learns that Mr. Burpee is succeeding admirably with his Railway survey, having reached a distance of 13 miles from the City, a section which was declared in the House of Assembly last winter to be impracticable. The difficulty at Clark's mountain, where former surveys placed a tunnel, he has avoided, without any cuttings of importance, or other work heavier than on the Shediac road.

On Friday last the Directors of the Western Extension Company commenced to circulate the Stock List, and in a very few hours between \$40,000 and \$20,000 was subscribed. The Directors took \$20,000 themselves, the largest subscription being that of William Parks, Esq., \$7,500. Influential and energetic gentlemen are engaged in working the list up, and, in a few days we expect to hear that the most sanguine anticipations of the movers have been realized. Recent developments give a zest to the movement in this city. It is a fact that the St. Stephen people are taking an exceedingly deep interest in up river trade just now, and have a ready arranged to survey a branch line from St. Andrew's road into Woodstock, leaving the road at a point some distance below Richmond Station! It is evident that a deep game is being played, and that if the people of St. John do not arouse themselves, the shrewd capitalists and merchants of St. Stephen will anticipate them, in securing the trade of the up river country. It must not be forgotten that St. Stephen is now most favourably situated as a port for the shipment of lumber, since the export duty on that article shipped from there has been taken off. A word to the wise, &c. Matters are now looking very favorable for the construction of the line from Moncton to Truro.

Canada.

A YOUNG MONTREALER who enlisted in the Federal army, was this week shot for attempted desertion; another, a member of a highly respectable family, who had been travelling in the South, on a pass from General Beaugard, and who foolishly reported himself to the Federal authorities on reaching Baltimore on his way home, has been sentenced to be shot on the 5th on a false accusation of being a spy. These things, and arrests such as that of Mr. Levey are creating a bitter feeling of indignation against Federal spies here, many of whom are known, and which will one of these days express itself in a manner exceedingly unpleasant to these rascals, whether they call themselves Sanitary Commission Agents, or not.—*Montreal Telegraph.*

The Canadian Premier has stated that his Government have applied to the Governments of the Lower Provinces to confer with the Canadian Government on the subject of a Union of the Provinces, the object of the Canadian Government being to put an end to the present state of affairs in Canada, which is almost a dead lock, neither party having strength to govern the country, and anarchy and confusion, financial difficulty, and troubles of all kinds being apprehended.

The Canadian House of Assembly has passed a Temperance Bill, which it is thought will also pass the other branch of the Legislature and become law. By this bill every county or local council may prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquor, but must submit their by-law for such purpose to the electors for approval, licenses already issued to become void; and no intoxicating liquor to be sold, on any pretence except for medical, or sacramental purposes.

Mr. S. G. Levey, who was arrested by the Federal authorities, on the arrival of the Asia at Boston, on Thursday week, without cause assigned; who was deprived of his papers and imprisoned in a cell, has sent the following telegram to a friend in Montreal, dated on Saturday:—

"NEW YORK, June 4, 1864.—Just released. No charge against me. All well. Will write. "S. G. LEVEY."

This arrest and release can only be described as a monstrous outrage. It is a cause which takes us back to the days of King John in England, before the Barons wrung from that monarch the Great Charter; which takes us to the rule of Russia in Poland, or Austria in Venetia; but which three or four short years ago we never could have thought, could have come to pass, among a people speaking the English language and inheriting the traditions of British Freedom. Mr. Levey was imprisoned from Thursday, May 26, to Saturday, June 4, which is ten days, there being no charge against him, nor even the shadow of one. He is a British subject, and a British merchant, happening to touch the port of Boston in a British passenger

steamship. We are assured on the authority of our friends who know him well, that his opinions are not in favor of the secessionists; but he is on the contrary a Northern sympathiser—i. e., if reflection in the leisure of a Federal cell has not altered his views. The conclusion of the whole is, that he is a victim of a rank and noxious spy system which has grown up on the grave of liberty, and which must have branches or ramifications on British soil.—*Montreal Gazette.*
