The people rose to demand satisfaction for the outraged journalist, and the result is that the Chamberlain, who was implicated in his son's offence, has been dismissed from his post. The Government has instructed the Ambassador at London to endeavour to obtain some modification of the treaty for the cession of the Ionian Islands.

INDIA.

Sir John Lawrence landed in Calcutta on the evening of the 12th January, and immediately assumed the office of Viceroy and Governor-General of India. His Excellency, who was in apparently the best of health, was received with the most enthusiastic acclamations on the part of the European and native public, and with an official pomp and state surpassing what is usual on such occasions. His appointment to the head of the Government of India has not only given the highest satisfaction to the native population, but has been received by them with a feeling of gratitude to her Majesty's Government.
