

was as thronged as ever, and the numerous audience listened with marked attention to the reports of the churches, presented by the Rev. B. Millard, the energetic secretary of the Union, the report of the day-schools by the Rev. W. Tuall, secretary of the Educational Society, and the report of the Sabbath-school, by the Rev. C. E. Randall.

"Each of these reports was deeply interesting, and showed on the whole that, though there was much to mourn over, still there was also abundant cause to take courage and go onward.

"An address of the most earnest and solemn character delivered by the Rev. D. J. East, was followed by Mr. Hewett, who, after glancing for a few moments at the gloomy side of the picture shown forth by the reports, stated reasons why the Baptist denomination had great cause for thankfulness even for the past year, inasmuch as they had been enabled to support the cause of God amongst them, to raise nearly 1,400l. for building and repairing purposes, and at the same time to contribute nearly 1,500l. toward missionary objects, and this without going to the House of Assembly or the Parish Vestry for a penny of these amounts. The meeting joined in a hymn of praise and separated, highly gratified by the week's proceedings.

"It is calculated on reasonable grounds that more than 10,000 individuals took part in the different services.

Among the speakers are the names both of European and native ministers, who in this joyful celebration stood side by side to advocate the cause of Him who hath made of one blood all nations of men; and the mingling of their labors was a noble testimony alike to the unity and the equality of the human race. The occasion also called forth an enthusiastic outburst of loyalty to our beloved sovereign the Queen. At the close of his speech Mr. Henderson reminded the people that the commencement of the reign of her Most Gracious Majesty had inaugurated the glorious Act of Emancipation; and having touchingly referred to the trials of her widowhood, he called for an expression of attachment to her person and government. And, oh! it was a stirring scene,—three thousand of the sons and daughters of Africa were in an instant on their feet; and the spacious building rang again and again with their hearty and almost tumultuous cheers. On any other occasion it might not have appeared seemly to that place, but on this, in celebration of fifty years of mercy, which included liberation from bondage of nearly a million of the human family, a demonstration of loyalty on the part of the emancipated and their children to the sovereign, in whose crown the "Act of their Emancipation" will ever shine as one of its brightest gems, was worthy of any place, however sacred.

His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of Jamaica, in answer to an Address presented to him by the Baptist Union, said:—

"I cannot, gentlemen, close my reply without briefly adverting to the gratifying account which I saw in one of the daily journals, that at your recent meeting at Montego Bay, there could not have been less than ten thousand persons assembled to meet you in celebration of the jubilee, and that yet (to use the words of that journal) 'not a single police case has resulted from this mammoth and memorable demonstration.'

"What a contrast this peaceful and orderly assembly, to celebrate a religious service, presents to days gone by! Surely when the influence of the Christian missionary is so powerful in the preservation of outward conduct and decorum, we may reasonably hope that it is not without its effect upon the inner man, and that as years pass by, and successive generations follow each other, the failings and vices of the rural population, in a great degree due to yet unextinguished and degrading influences descended from slavery, may give way before the practice and the teaching of Christian ministers, and that our country people may become in after years as industrious, as honest, as truthful, and as virtuous as are the peasantry of any other country.

"Persevere then, gentlemen, in the holy undertaking in which you are engaged, and doubt not but that in His own good time God will grant an answer to your prayers and a blessing upon your labours."

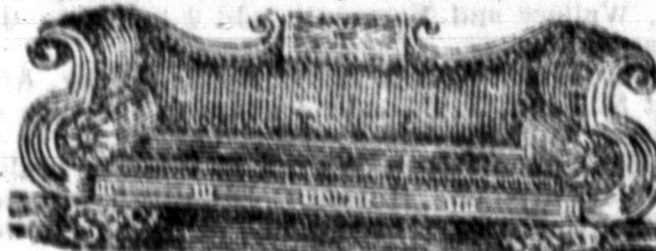
