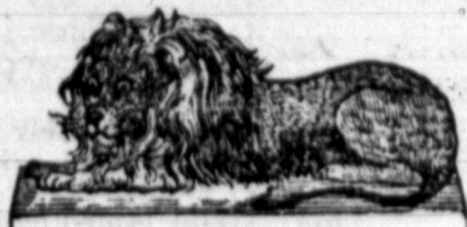

NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC,
 AND
Instructions to all Postmasters.

PATTERN POST

BETWEEN
 Nova Scotia and the United Kingdom.

ON and from this date, Patterns of Merchandize may be transmitted by Post between Nova Scotia and England, by Packet, at the following rates of Postage, which must be prepaid by means of Postage Stamps.

For a Packet not exceeding 4 oz., 7 Cents.
 Above 4 oz. and not exceeding 1 lb., 12 Cts.
 Above 1 lb. and not exceeding 1 1/2 lbs., 25 Cents.
 Above 1 1/2 lbs., and not exceeding 2 lbs., 37 Cts.
 Above 2 lbs., and not exceeding 2 1/2 lbs., 50 Cts.
 Every additional 1/2 lb., 12 1/2 Cents.

Special attention is directed to the following Rules and Regulations, which will be strictly enforced:—

1st. No packet of Patterns must exceed two feet in length, breadth, or depth; exceeding such dimensions, it will be treated and charged as a letter.

2nd. The Patterns must not be of intrinsic value. This rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and, indeed, whatever may have a value of its own, apart from its mere use as a pattern; and the quantity of any material sent ostensibly as a Pattern must not be so great that it can fairly be considered as having, on this ground, an intrinsic value. Packets containing patterns of intrinsic value will be treated and charged as letters.

3rd. There must be no writing or printing other than the address of the person for whom the packet is intended, the address of the sender, a trade mark and numbers, and the price of the article; otherwise the packet will be treated as a letter.

4th. The Patterns must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and so forth, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material tied at the neck. Bags so closed that they cannot be readily opened, even although they be transparent, must not be used for this purpose. Non-compliance with this rule will also subject the packet to be treated as a letter.

In all other respects the regulations of the Colonial Book Post will apply to the Pattern Post. Under these Regulations, in order to prevent any interruption to the regular transmission of letters, a packet of patterns may, when it is necessary, be kept back for One Mail beyond the time when in the ordinary course it would be forwarded.

The rule which forbids the transmission through the Post of any article likely to injure the contents of the Mail Bags or the person of any Officer of the Post Office, is, of course, applicable to the Pattern Post; and a packet containing anything of the kind will be stopped, and not sent to its destination.
